ty. The County Superintendent, J. E. Calavan, and Supervisor McCormick will be the speakers of the evening. The school will also present a program that will prove interesting.

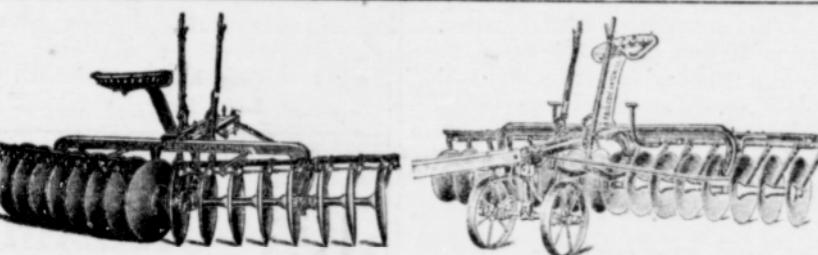
