R. H. Troy, of the Troy Laundry, pointed out the handicap that the East Side would suffer from any curtailment of the present postal facilities on the East Side.

On motion it was decided to join with the congressman in a telegram to the department at Washington, and also to ask the aid of Senators Chamberlain and Lane in securing better postal facilities for the East Side. A committee was appointed to take up the matter with the Portland Chamber of Commerce and another committee was appointed to prepare a petition to the department asking for retention of the station with increased facilities, to be circulated among the implement houses on the East Side.

It was announced at the luncheon that the inspector had turned down all tenders of locations on Grand avenue and that the inspector had stated that he would not consider any locations. The inspector stated to the committee from the club that he can save \$7000 a year by consolidating the station with station E on the West Side.
