ROCK ROADS FOR THREE DISTRICTS

Three road districts in eastern Clackamas have combined to get crushed rock roads, and the work is going to be done. It will be commenced in a few weeks and will proceed all of this season and throughout other seasons until the road systems in that section are as good as crushed rock can make them.

The districts of Sandy, Cottrell and Firwood have secured a rock crusher from the Clackamas county court which will be installed on the Peter Hiatt farm about one mile north of Sandy. A ledge of rock, equal to that at Kelly Butte has been found about two hundred feet below the crest of the bluff overlooking the Sandy river, on which the crusher will be set up. The owner of the land has given the rock to the three districts free of cost, having signed an agreement to that effect and will allow free rent and access to the crusher.

The crusher to be set up will have a capacity of 100 yards of rock per day. It will be operated by electricity as will the tramcar which will be used to bring the rock from the quarry to the crusher, a distance of 800 feet.

Lumber for bunkers has been ordered to the amount of 30,000 feet. It will be hauled to the site and work commenced in a few days.

It is the intention to begin road work at Bear Creek, about two miles beyond Cottrell and go to Sandy this year, possibly further. There will be no let-up until all the main roads are thoroughly improved.
