The Prohibition Army in European Trenches.

The president of the Russian Duma, in his speech opening the new session on February 9, 1915, referred to the prohibition of vodka in the following words: "Accept, great monarch, the lowest reverence of the people. Thy people firmly believe that an end has been put for all eternity to this ancient curse." According to the London Times, at these words "a scene of indescribable enthusiasm ensued, the house rising and singing the national hymn."

In a letter dated December 21, 1914, and issued by the British Press Bureau on January 12, 1915, Professor Pares, the British official "eyewitness" with the Russian troops, says: "A main feature is the infinitely superior physique, spirit and endurance of the Russian soldiers, who have made wonderful marches, endured recoveries from the most serious wounds."

Recently the Prime Minister of Great Britain stated in the House of Commons that 60 per cent of wounded British soldiers returned to duty. The records of the Russian army, however, show a recovery and return to duty of 85 per cent of wounded.
