At a meeting of swine breeders at North Portland last Tuesday arrangements were perfected for furnishing the boys and girls of all sections of the state with breeding animals with which to make a start in the raising of pork for market. The plan was inaugurated by the Union stockyards some weeks ago, but the call for sows was so great that it was found necessary to enlist the aid of professional hog breeders in order to supply the demand. The stockyards will receive orders for sows, already bred, pass them on to the breeders who have agreed to furnish stock, and on receipt of a properly indorsed note from boy or girl, the animal will be shipped direct. The notes will become due and payable at the time the pigs are mature and ready for market.

bands of music will be provided at the opening of the market. Farmers who have promised to provide the market with produce are asked to keep this date in mind. The booths have been made ready for their accommodation. East Portland consumers are invited to come to the market.

Mr. Messerve, who will be in charge of this market, made an extended trip through the eastern part of Multnomah and also Clackamas county and interested a large number of farmers in this East Side market. Mr. Messerve hopes and expects to introduce a wholesale feature to the East Washington street market. He has ascertained that the Italian market on Union avenue and East Main street will be discontinued in the near future, and he thinks that there will be room for a wholesale department, which will not interfere with the retail department. In his trip through the suburban districts the farmers wanted to know if such a department could be maintained at the East Side market.

More than 30 stalls have been provided, but if these are not sufficient more will be built. The arrangements for the opening will be completed within the next few days. It is expected that the Washington high school band and police band will give concerts at the opening of the market.

Instead of a two-story building at the northeast corner of Grand avenue and East Alder street for the East Side Business Men's club and the Citizens bank, a four-story modern building may be erected, if the present plans are carried on. Hasalo lodge of Odd Fellows has been negotiating to take stock in the holding company, and add another story to the first proposed two-story structure. Pending the outcome of these negotiations the plans for the erection of the building in any form have been suspended. Preliminary sketches were made of a four-story building. If the lodge goes in the holding company it will take the two upper stories. It will necessitate the increase of the capital stock from \$25,000 to \$75,000 or \$100,000, as the cost of the four-story structure will be about that sum with its equipment. It is expected that definite results may be secured during the present month.
