Glacier Protection.

Protecting itself against a glacier is the peculiar problem that confronts the town of Valdez, Alaska. This glacier, situated between mountain masses several miles away, has proved dangerous in periods of long sunshine when great masses of ice sometimes fall to the ground, releasing tons of water that had been held in pools and ponds on the glacier.

The water rushing to the town picks up trees and boulders on the way, often doing considerable damage, as in 1911, when 108 structures were carried to the ocean. United States army officers conceived the idea of preventing the recurrence of such floods by the construction of a dike.
