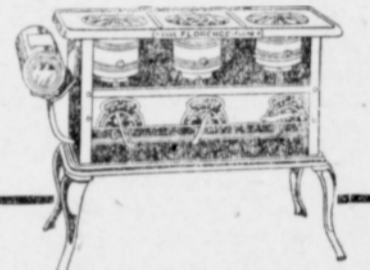
Summer Sewing School.
