More Testing Associations

Two more cow-testing associations have been added to the list of Oregon dairy clubs, according to reports from the Oregon Agricultural College. One is at Monmouth in Polk county and the other at Carlton and McMinnville in Yamhill county. This makes a total of fourteen cow-testing associations in Oregon. Some of the eastern states have a large number of associations, according to W. A. Barr, field dairy specialist, but the associations are formed with fewer cows than in Oregon, some of the associations having not more than 300 cows. In Oregon the number of cows runs from 500 to 800, so that it is quite likely there are more cows under test in Oregon than in any other state in the Union.
