Obituary.

E. G. Rickert was born in Ticondoga, N. Y., August 19, 1845, and died at his home four miles southeast of Corbett August 23, 1915, aged 70 years and four days. He enlisted in 1861 in the second N. Y. Volunteer Cavalry, serving three years. He was the sixth of eight brothers, two of whom survive him. He leaves to mourn his loss a wife and ten children.

Notice is hereby given that on Monday, September 13, 1915, the Board of Equalization of Multnomah County will attend at the office of the County Assessor, at the Courthouse in Portland, and publicly examine the assessment rolls for the year 1915, and correct all errors in valuation, description or qualities of lands, lots or other property, assessed by the County Assessor. And it shall be the duty of the persons interested to appear at the time and place appointed. If it shall appear to such Board of Equalization that there are any lands or lots or other property assessed twice, or incorrectly assessed as to description or quantity, and in the name of a person or persons not the owner thereof, or assessed under or beyond the actual full cash value thereof, said Board may make proper correction of the same. If it shall appear to such Board that any land, lots or other property assessable by the Assessor are not assessed, such Board shall assess the same at the full cash value thereof.
