### Home Canning of Vegetables

#### String Beans.

Use fresh, tender, green beans. The bean in the pod must be small. Wash and string, if they are not the stringless kind. (Do not raise any but the stringless green pod variety—it saves time.) The pods should be cut or broken into small bits from an inch to an inch and a half long. Cutting them into small, oblique pieces makes a choice pack. The cut beans should be placed in a square of cheese cloth or wire basket and dipped into boiling water—keeping them in it for at least two minutes. Remove from boiling water, pack in jars to within one-half inch of top and just cover with boiling water containing salt to season. Partially seal and place in boiler; boil for sixty minutes. Remove, tighten lids, and store in dark, cool place.

Never open jars after cooking to see if vegetables are cooked. Count time for cooking when water is at a jumping boil.

Be sure and leave one-half inch of space above the liquid when the cans are filled.

Hot liquids used in canning is best; it saves time and improves quality of pack.

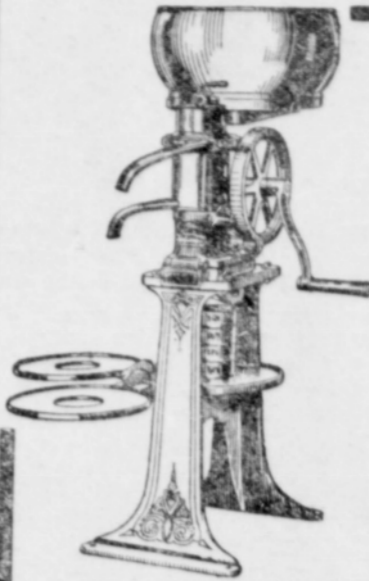
#### Upas Trees Not Deadly.

Among the long established beliefs which have in recent years been sadly disturbed is that of the deadly character of the upas tree. The exhalations of this tree were held to be so deadly that no animal life could survive within 150 feet of it. Dr. J. D. Gimlette, an Englishman, who has lived among the Malays for eighteen years, cites a story that when the poison from this tree is wanted by a Malay witch doctor twenty condemned criminals are sent for it. Usually only one or two return alive, and these are pardoned. He says that as a matter of fact, the "deadly upas" is largely a fake; that the tree may be chopped down in safety by any one with a strong arm and a keen ax. The Malay smears his creese or arrow, says the doctor, with the inspissated juice of the tree and if the wound is deep enough, the poison produces a toxic effect on the heart similar to that produced by digitalis or by strophanthus, a climbing vine of West Africa, which yields an arrow poison which acts directly on the muscles of the heart.

Telephone poles of glass molded over a heavy wire net are being made in Europe. These poles are rarely broken, will neither rot nor rust, and are impregnable to insects.
