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AUTOMOBILE RECKLESSNESS.

Automobile accidents are becoming of such frequent occurrence that the only deduction to be made is that they are mostly caused by reckless driving.

At the present rate of increase in the number of machines it will become necessary in the city of Portland, at least, to so regulate the traffic that autos may run in only one direction on any one street.

The crying need, however, is more care in driving. We all know of instances where more caution should be observed, and if the reckless drivers will not become careful of their own accord they should be made so by the application of a law rigid enough to compel attention to it.

CAUSE OF CANCER

Increasing mortality from cancer is rousing the Rockefeller institute to further efforts to discover its cause and it is now announced by two of the investigators that in the white lymph cells of the blood there are the necessary factors in making human beings and all other animals immune to the disease.

But there is another scientist who has made the claim of discovering the real cause of cancer and his explanation seems the most plausible. He asserts that an over-excess of heat applied anywhere to the body, inside or out, is the true cause and cites instances and percentages to bolster up his theory.

The death rate in the six New England states from cancer is one person for each 1000. Any means or theory for combatting the disease should be fully investigated and the results be made known.

CORN FOR STOCK FOOD

The O. W. R. & N. corn demonstration at the county fair, under the supervision of "Farmer" Smith, and his son, should be educational to everyone alike, but more particularly so to the dairyman who is seeking a good winter milk food for his cows.

A few experiments are being made in this vicinity with Kaffir corn for testing its value as a stock food crop, but Mr. Smith says emphatically that he has little faith in it, although it grows well here and yields fully ten per cent better than the other and better known kinds.

EVENING STAR ANNIVERSARY

PORTLAND, Sept. 6.—Special.—Judge Cleeton, J. J. Johnson, Mrs. L. H. Additon and Wilson Benefel were the speakers Saturday afternoon at the celebration of the 42d anniversary of the founding of Evening Star grange, No. 27, Patrons of Husbandry, held in the hall on the Section Line road.

"Evening Star grange has been a factor in this county and state," said Mr. Johnson, "for education and pro-

gressive laws. It has stood as a unit for all good purposes and it stands united today. The National Grange was organized in 1867, and Evening Star is nearly as old as the order. It is a fact that every law and measure the National Grange has ever proposed has become laws in this country, and there has never been an instance where the National Grange has ever been called on to retract a single measure, for the reason it is a body that never takes action without careful consideration.

In his address Judge Cleeton gave a comprehensive review of the Juvenile court since he took charge, and asked the co-operation of the grade. He said this court was to be made helpful, for boys and girls in securing homes, and never to be made an instrument of punishment.

"With the opening of the schools," said Judge Cleeton, "we shall have the friendly co-operation of every school in Portland. The principal, one of the grade teachers and a parent in each will co-operate with the juvenile court to help boys and girls. We shall have fifty such local organizations all to be friendly and helpful, and we want the grange to help us. Every boy and girl has the right to a home, and we want to see that they get one.
