

## UNION HIGH SCHOOL HAS 140 ON ROLL

Union high school, No. 2, located here, the successor of the Gresham high school, threw open its doors yesterday morning in the new building recently completed on North Main street.

The building has been visited by quite a number of people during the period since it was turned over to the district, all of whom are fully impressed with the idea that the five districts embracing the union district made no mistake in banding together in the effort to provide for this vicinity one of the best schools in the state.

The faculty consists of Elmer F. Goodwin, principal; Charles E. Bee, science and manual training; Eva Struggles, English and Latin. Mary E. Good, mathematics and bookkeeping; Hazel Cartan, domestic science and physiology; Edith Vaughn McCormick, history and German; Ellen Adams Pomeroy, voice culture.

Enrollment yesterday at the opening of the union high school was 140. There will probably be 15 in the senior class and about 70 in the freshman class. There are four or five who are taking a post graduate course. The opening attendance is considered to be very encouraging and there is a certainty that more will enroll.

Many persons called last week to inspect the building and confer with Principal Goodwin.

So much has been said concerning the progress of the enterprise since its inception that a brief outline of its history is deemed appropriate at this time:

A meeting of the Board of Directors of Gresham District, No. 4, held on September 24, 1914, a movement was started to organize Union High School District, No. 2, of Multnomah county. The board visited County Superintendent A. P. Armstrong, in Portland, the next day for information as to the procedure, and petitions were circulated in five districts, calling for an election on the proposition. Gresham had paved the way a year before by purchasing a site for a new building, and it was determined to donate the site, containing four acres, to the new organization in the event of the success of the undertaking.

The districts interested were Gresham, No. 4; Terry, No. 8; Powell Valley, No. 26; Lynch, No. 28 and Hillview, No. 83. An election was called in these districts by the county superintendent for November 28, to vote on the proposition of forming a Union High School District. The result of the election was as follows: Gresham—for, 168; against, 3. Terry—for, 19; against, 11. Powell Valley—for, 4; against, 30. Lynch—for, 18; against, 10. Hillview—for, 7; against, 3. Total—for, 216; against, 57.

The union high school board organized with Charles Cleveland, Andrew Brugger, P. A. Johnson, Antone Hendrickson and Lewis Yunker, chairmen of their respective boards in the order given above, as directors. K. A. Miller was elected clerk and a tax of 1 1/4 mills was levied for maintenance covering all the five districts. It was reported to the board that there were 120 pupils in the five districts eligible to the union high school, which opened in the public school building in Gresham on February 1, 1915, with a competent staff of instructors.

On December 12, 1914, the high school board discussed a proposition for a new building to be erected by the union high school district on the site previously offered by the Gresham district. It was voted at that time to issue bonds for \$20,000 and to make a tax levy of 2 mills. Also, a building was authorized to not exceed in cost the sum of \$25,000 fully equipped. Later the bonds were sold for a premium of 6 per cent.

On March 10th the bids for construction of the building were opened. J. H. Tillman & Co. were the successful bidders at a price of \$17,990. The hot water heating system and furnishings were all extra but were kept within the limit. The building was turned over to the district last month fully equipped.

Canby fair began yesterday and will hold four days, ending on Thursday night in order to allow the exhibitors a chance to move their displays to Salem for the state fair next week. Several persons from here will attend the county fair on Thursday.
