

MILITARISM
IS BUGABOO
OF GRANGE

Transactions of Pomona grange, which met at Lents on Wednesday were confined principally to the discussion of four resolutions.

The usual social features were observed and there was a large attendance. The evening session was given over to the initiation of a small class in the fifth degree and the rendition of an excellent program. The next session will be held at Fairview the third Wednesday in December.

The principal resolution discussed was offered by the committee on women's work. The first section, pertaining to military duty in the high schools, met with considerable opposition and was finally stricken out.

The following extracts are here-with reproduced:

One of the late things that is brought to our notice is a proposition to give military training in our high schools, and forthwith some of our good sisters are up in arms in opposition, and while not desiring to enter the fray, yet we can ill afford to sit on the fence in any of these controversies where the "weal and woe" of woman is at stake personally. We are not radical on this point and while a lover of peace we can really see no ill effects to be feared from the preliminary training of our boys at high school. Certainly the exercises would be beneficial, adding grace to movements and a military bearing, which is not bad.

We have a precedent in our own O. A. C., which we are all proud of and some how we can't see that the war spirit has much to do with it, but should we ever be forced to war, which in the order of things may some time occur, would it not be as well to be prepared in part, as to be wholly at the mercy of our enemies? It took war to establish our liberty, it cost blood to maintain it. Some how we never altogether took up with the sentiment, "I didn't raise my boy to be a soldier," or the sentiment of a lady who didn't want her boy to go into the water until he could swim.

We are, as we see by the papers, getting so much opposed to militarism that some of our teachers are opposed to the children in the grammar schools marching in or out of school, to us that looks sickly and absurd.

At a late grange meeting we listened to some excellent talks on juvenile work, by Judge Cleaton, and Mrs. Addison, which was very instructive and beneficial and while endorsing their policies we would go still further though along other lines, and hold the parents of those wayward and sinful boys accountable for their idleness and vices. Of course this is not always true, yet in a majority of cases the parents could reach these cases if taken in time, and where not so done the parents are censurable, to say the least; for if children are allowed to drift around town night and day until 14 or 16 years old in all kinds of company, except the best, without endorsement or restraint it will be a difficult task even for the best of probation officers to redeem or even to interest them. There are many things that tend to degrade our boys and girls, chiefest among these perhaps is object lessons. There is nothing more useful or worthy than the alpha pictures provided the right kinds are used; yet how many there are that is anything but pure, notwithstanding their censorship. See the attitudes the easy conquests and embraces! How many of the mothers would desire their daughters to go to such lengths? Yet they are taught by object lessons to our children. Surely mothers have "women's" work to do.

In the new temperance plan we have only just begun. The battle is yet undecided, it is up to women whether we win or lose out. The new environments must be met, substitutes be supplied, and a campaign of education continued.

In conclusion let us note where we are at—we can't change human nature. There is strife and conflicts at arms. There always will be until the millennium. The purity of the picture show is in the hands of the women for they are largely in the majority of attendance, and can make or break the business by concert of action. To make a success of our temperance laws we must be alive and active.

A resolution on rural credits, introduced by W. H. H. Dufur, was adopted. The substance of it, leaving out the preamble follows:

Resolved, That the farmers of the state of Oregon and the nation, through their respective states, be accorded the same privilege as forty-three associations of national banks in dealing direct with the United States treasury, by depositing state bonds as collateral and drawing therefrom currency to almost the amount of the face value of these bonds without further payment of discount or interest, this currency to be loaned, with proper safeguards, to the farmers by the state at an interest rate not to exceed four per cent; be it further

Resolved, That the Pomona grange of Multnomah county hereby endorse the action taken by the last session of the state grange in adopting the resolution introduced there by W.

LOCAL MEN
WIN PRIZES
IN CONTEST

Four Gresham fair directors, O. F. Miller, D. M. Roberts, C. M. Lake and E. L. Thorpe, went to Canby yesterday to attend the last day of the Clackamas county fair.

Several exhibitors from this vicinity had livestock on exhibition, among them being G. H. Dammeler, W. H. Cleveland and Samuel Weis. C. M. Lake also had some poultry there, as did W. H. Cleveland. The results in the livestock contests at Canby were somewhat different from the results here last week, but all of them took good premiums. O. J. Brown's mare won the trot on Monday and it was said that the races were remarkably good during the whole week. They were good yesterday. Canby has a better race track and grandstand than Gresham.

In the Jersey awards G. H. Dammeler took grand champion female premium, one cow, first, 1 bull calf first and two seconds on younger females. He had nine head in the contest. His animals were not in good condition when being judged as they were full of water and somewhat bloated, the judging having begun early in the morning, after watering.

W. H. Cleveland secured the champion bull award for Jerseys, cow, first; junior heifer, first; get of one sire, four animals, first; product of one cow, first and second on yearling heifer. He had six animals.

Hughes Bros. of Clackamas county took one first on get of sire, while M. H. Smith of Oregon City secured one second on seven animals. They both entered in the Jersey class. Ritchey Bros., of Boring got one second on a Guernsey heifer under one year. They had four animals.

In the sheep awards W. H. Cleveland took ten first and four seconds in the Dorset Horn class; he was also awarded eight first and six seconds on poultry.

C. M. Lake carried away four firsts and two seconds on Dominiques in the poultry awards.

Canby's fair falls a long way short of our fair in every respect. The Clackamas county exhibit is really first-class but it is intended for Salem next week and must necessarily be very good to compete against the other counties.

But one grange exhibit, Warner grange, is worthy of mention. All the other exhibits were of good quality but of inferior size. The grounds are badly laid out and the buildings are cheap.

One feature excelled Gresham, and that was the number of campers on the grounds. There were more than 40 tents in the grove, while here there were but seven.

The Canby fair was a financial success this year and the spirit of "go" was noticed. It should grow to more respectable proportions.

A pamphlet printed by the state has been received by the Outlook, containing general information with reference to the laws of Oregon governing weights and measures, and the sale of commodities by weight or measure.

Among the items of most importance to the farmers and others of this vicinity are the sections referring to mill feeds. All mill feeds, including crushed or ground grains, bran and shorts shall be sold by weight, and any person violating the provisions of the act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor which is punishable in the courts.
