The cultivation of tobacco in France is strictly controlled by the national government and is practically confined to twenty-seven departments. Licenses are issued to communes or districts authorizing the cultivation of tobacco on a specific area. This area is then allotted to certain growers, and from the planting to the gathering of the crop every plant is under the supervision of government officials. As the government is the sole purchaser of the leaf when grown, it maintains a practical control over the amount that may be produced in a given year. No bounties are paid for the growing of tobacco, and the price paid is according to the quality of leaf grown and the requirements of the regime.

German technical papers are re-visiting the idea of reclaiming fats and other useful products from sewage. Dr. H. Bechhold of Frankfurt, estimates that the sewage of German cities contains at least 10 grams of grease per capita a day, and that its total value is more than \$14,000,000 per annum.
