Poultry Green Food.

Plenty of green food for the poultry, all they will eat, is an important item in poultry rations during the winter egg-laying season as well as at other times of the year. This can be supplied by growing kale and other winter greens outside the pen and giving the birds daily quantities, or by sowing a fall pasture of vetch, rape, mustard, rye, wheat, oats, or other crop that will make consistent winter growth. In the latter case the fowls will have to be kept off the sowed area until the young plants get well established, when they will afford the hens all they need with no trouble to the owner. Provided in either way the greens will have a beneficial effect upon the health of the flock as well as exert a valuable influence on the yield and quality of the eggs.

The most wonderful salt mines in the world are situated at Wieliczka, a small town nine miles from Krakow, Poland. The mines have been worked since the eleventh century, but their productiveness seems unending. They are on seven levels, connected with the surface by eleven shafts, and have more than sixty-five miles of chambers and passages. Within them also is Lake Pysykes, 195 feet long, 120 feet broad and from ten to twenty-six feet deep. In some chambers of the mines, statues, candelabra, altars and even two large chapels have been cut out of rock salt. A large dancing salon has also been hollowed out of the living salt.

Vilna, Russia, is probably the only place in the world where geese are shod. The district around this town is celebrated for producing geese, too numerous for profitable sale locally, which are driven on foot in large flocks to very distant markets. To prevent the birds getting foot-sore on the long journey, they are made during the late autumn to practice the now notorious German "goose step," first in tar, and then through fine sand. The geese are thus provided with perfectly fitting pairs of boots in which they can comfortably perform the 200-mile march to the goose fair at Warsaw without having to cackle for a chiropodist.—Westminster Gazette.

Fairview Library Day Changed.
