Salmon streets, will hold its last public services there the last Sunday in this month. While the organization will hold together for some time until its obligations have been settled, it will cease its evangelistic work in the community. Its members may be absorbed into other churches. The total mortgage on the stone structure is from \$35,000 to \$40,000, and the congregation decided it could not pay that debt off, and voted to turn the property over to the holder of the mortgage. It is announced that a new church is being organized in the community formerly occupied by the Central Christian church, with Rev. A. L. Crim as pastor. The organizers, it is announced, are mainly people outside the Central Christian church, with perhaps some of the members of the latter. It is stated that the new congregation will not use the stone building, but may select a site and erect a suitable chapel. The stone church was built at a cost of nearly \$80,000, while Rev. J. F. Ghormley was pastor.

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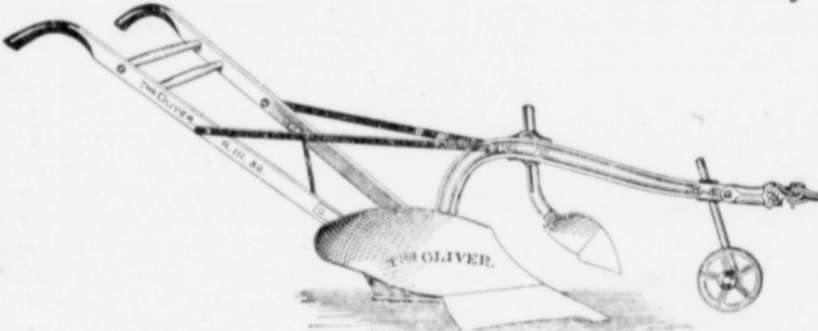
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
