

GEORGE H. ZIMMERMAN DIES OF APOPLEXY

One of the best known residents of the Columbia slough district, George H. Zimmerman, died at his farm on the Sandy road about 10 o'clock Saturday night from an apoplectic stroke after a brief illness of only a few hours.

On Saturday afternoon he attended the Methodist quarterly conference at the Rockwood church and then went to the farm to look after some private affairs in charge of his tenant. He was taken ill about four o'clock and soon relapsed into unconsciousness from which he never rallied. Dr. H. H. Hughes was sent for who pronounced his case hopeless; another physician from Portland also gave the same verdict. Nothing could be done to save him and he died quietly while still unconscious.

Mr. Zimmerman had lived for more than twenty years on his farm, but about five years ago he leased it and moved with his family to Portland. He was 63 years of age and leaves a widow and three daughters. They are Mrs. Jessie Miller, of Vancouver; Olive and Isabella, both well known in eastern Multnomah, and a sister, Mrs. Eliza Stone of Fairview. A daughter, Mabel, died about a year ago.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow forenoon, with interment in the Masonic cemetery on the Sandy road.
