PREPAREDNESS MEANS SOBRIETY

Last month Richard P. Hobson spoke at the Progressive Business Men's club luncheon at the Multnomah hotel, Portland, on "Preparedness."

Having been connected with the navy for eighteen years, and member of congress for several years, he spoke with authority.

He does not favor a large army, says forts are inadequate. He called attention to our miles of Pacific coast where an army could be landed anywhere except in front of the few forts. What we need is a navy larger and stronger than that of any country that maintains a large standing army, to prevent a landing.

After talking interestingly for an hour, he concluded by saying, "Gentlemen, what we need most, is sober men." Target practice shows the average hits out of a hundred shots, as follows: sober men 34, men two hours after taking one glass of beer six.

He called attention to the appalling prevalence of weakness in children of drinking parents, congratulated the people on the big majority vote that made Oregon dry.

Next Tuesday in Gresham three councilmen are to be elected. "What we need most is sober men."

There appears to be an inclination to fight my re-election on the wet and dry issue.

Let me say first that it is the duty of every loyal man and woman in Gresham to vote on Tuesday for men who are in sympathy with the prohibition law. It means business and pleasure, as demonstrated in Gresham the past two years.

I stand for "absolut dry." I would favor a city ordinance as stringent as the state prohibition law with an increased penalty that would make bootleggers sit up and take notice.

We need a dry council to support our dry marshal.

Don't think that because we have a good prohibition law the fight is over, from experience I know the fight is just beginning.
