Early Days of Coffee.

Joannes Gennadius, the Greek envoy to Great Britain, ascribes to a Greek named Nathaniel Canopies the introduction of coffee in that country in 1646 when Canopies was a student at Oxford, where he brewed the drink for his own use. The establishing of the first coffee house in London was, it is said, by a Greek named Pasqua, in 1650. Another writer gives the date of 1654 as that on which coffee was first sold in England. This was at Oxford and by a Jew named Jacobs. Oldys, the celebrated antiquary, states that the use of coffee in England was first known in 1657; that Mr. Edwards, a merchant, brought from Smyrna to London "one Pasqua Rosee, a Ragusan youth who prepared the drink for him every morning. Later the merchant allowed his said servant with another of his son-in-law to sell it publicly and the sign of the first coffee was Pasqua Rossee's own head." columns; but we are not taking a mean advantage of its liberality, for everybody knows as much about the weather as we do.

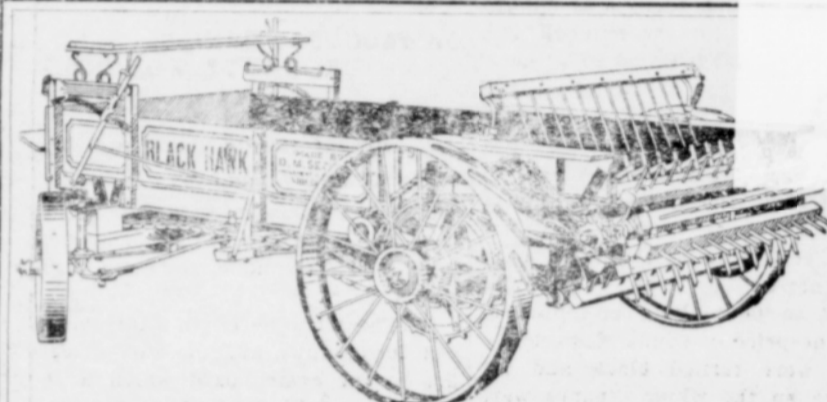
