Women Would Fight.

On Friday the French chamber of deputies had a charming little invasion. A half dozen young persons, like a part of a regiment, filed into the hall. They were in uniform; very short petticoats, closely fitting coats very much cut up as to the tails, gaiters that went almost to the knees. On each head was a broad-brimmed soft felt hat, neatly turned up on one side. Each carried in her hand a small switch and divers kinds of leather belts sustained a variety of money pouches.

At a distance one would have taken them to be Boy Scouts with particularly small feet. A nearer view showed that they were women, each with a serious and martial air. One could not have hesitated to say that they were Canadianes or Australiennes led hither by a spirit of adventure.

Not at all. They were Frenchwomen, beautiful and good, who desired to take part in the war, to serve the country as combatants. Their proceeding had no success except to excite curiosity. The deputies to whom they had sent their names and made known the object of their visit told them that no provision had been made for such service.

The captain, beautiful brunette that she was, voiced her disappointment quite loudly. "If they don't want to go," she said, "we will go and we'll show them that we know what to do. We are 20,000 ready to march as one man!"

British Sea Food.

Whatever may come to Great Britain in the way of high prices for meats she still will have a limitless supply of fish, a food supply denied to Germany and her allies. The London market quotes a good demand at fair prices for turbot, brill, halibut, soles, plaice, whiting, hake, gurnet, skate, live cod, red mullet, dorries, haddock, live and dead eels, etc. English mackerel are quoted at four shillings, about a dollar, for twenty, and dead cod at seven shillings six pence a stone, that is \$1.87 for fourteen pounds. Four boats at Yarmouth landed in spite of rough weather, 180 barrels of fresh fish. The price of herring went up from eighty shillings to 120 shillings a cran—that is, a barrel. Along the coast of Scotland many vessels were out. At Aberdeen sixteen vessels, all trawlers, landed a total of fifty-three tons. These with one exception were one-night trippers.

Facts About Sweden.

The Swedish government has issued an official catalogue of the exhibit insitained at the Panama fair. The book is really descriptive of conditions in Sweden. It takes, first, the geographical and general features of the country. A chapter is devoted to agriculture. Sweden, it is said, is an old "farmer's country." The greater part of the ground has never been made up of large estates. The country is consequently one of small proprietors. More than half the area of Sweden, a little more than 52,000,000 acres, is covered with forests. The nation is also rich in waterways and water power sites. Sweden has developed some of the latter sites to an efficient degree, there being special legislation covering the conservation of such national resources. Sweden, the catalogue says, possesses one of the greatest supplies of iron ore in Europe. Iron and steel industries are extensive. A large part of the book is given over to advertisements and special descriptions. Facts covering official activities and commercial developments show Sweden to be a progressive country.

Juvenile Court Doctors.

The medical profession is practically of one voice in approving an advance in Chicago, the attaching of an experienced physician to the juvenile courts of that city, whose business it is to make proper medical examination of youthful delinquents before they are improperly branded as criminals. The new method, it is believed, will be the means of saving these young offenders from lives of crime and will make them count in the community for future usefulness. Medical observation and attention should, it is held by some, be given to children while in school. Many of the delinquents who come before the juvenile courts have special physical defects which might be remedied if properly treated at the proper time.
