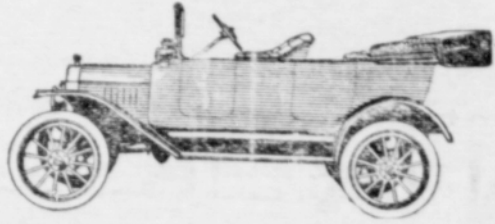


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BORING

ROAD SUPERVISOR MAKES STATEMENT

FAIRVIEW, Feb. 14.—Editor Outlook:—In your issue of the 11th inst. I notice this item: "Mr. Burns reported that Road Supervisors McKay and Hillyard went to the county commissioners to get aid in opening the roads after the storm, and were told by Mr. Lightner that the county had put on a crew to open the Highway, but that if the farmers wanted the cross-roads opened, they would have to shovel their way out."

So far as I am concerned, I wish to say that this statement gives a false impression. I received no orders from Mr. Lightner individually, nor from either of the other commissioners.

My only orders came from the roadmaster's office, and as they were in writing, I can show them at any time.

But in the emergency that existed, many farmers in Road Division No. 19, did a great deal of volunteer work following each of the two big storms, and where volunteers were numerous their roads were passable most of the time.

The most recent example of willingness to co-operate I found last Saturday when opening the cross-road from the Base Line to Troutdale, which is well known for deep drifts.

I met a crew of fifteen or twenty volunteers from Troutdale who had shoveled a full half mile of road, blocked all that distance with snow from four to eight feet deep, and the work was well done.

I have not talked with Mr. Burns for months, so I do not know who was his informant; but I am sure neither he nor the Outlook, would wish to have a mis-statement go uncorrected.
