heavy calipered with a well balanced and proportioned crown, and each to have (except in American Elm) a central leader extending from the roots to the top of the tree; that the tree shall have been transplanted within the past two years and have a dense, compact mass of fibrous roots. That the tree shall be dug and handled carefully, be free from breaks, bruises, disease, insect infections and like objections is understood.

Should you desire us to prepare a specification for use in taking bids we shall be glad to prepare one, as also any for planting or any other part of the work connected in achieving the placement of first class trees in workman-like shape upon the highways.

We estimate that this program will require between four and six thousand trees; that if you provide stakes, tying material and labor in planting, the trees can be secured for the appropriation we understand has been made available in the budget for the purpose, namely \$2000.

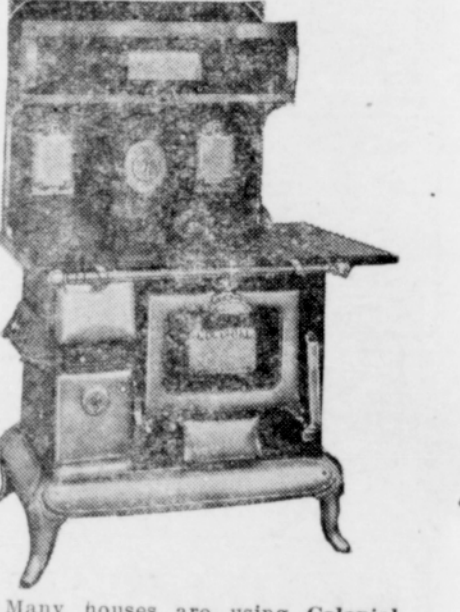
