## DIRECTORS APPEAL FOR MORE FUNDS

Gresham, March 6, 1915.

If you fail to respond we are sorry to say that in our opinion the prospect is good for our investment and the industry to pass beyond our control, which we feel sure will be regretted when it is too late; while we have the assurance that if you meet this appeal you can expect a dividend on your investment this year.

## DEATH AND FUNERAL OF MRS JOHN OLSON

The funeral of Mrs. John Olson took place on Tuesday of this week from the Haley Swedish Baptist church, Rev. Olson of Portland officiating. Interment was made in the Pleasant Home cemetery.

Mrs. Hanna Olson was born in Sweden December 11, 1856, and came to America in 1887. She was married to John Olson the same year at Buffalo, Minn. From there they moved to Kokato, where they lived until the autumn of 1912, when they came to Oregon.

Mrs. Olson was converted and baptized in Sweden in 1878. She was a member of the Swedish Baptist church in Kokato until the family came to Oregon when she transferred her membership to the Powell Valley Swedish Baptist church.

After a long illness she went to sleep in the faith of her Savior on Saturday, March 4th at 5:30 p. m. Her age was 59 years, two months and twenty-two days. She leaves, besides her husband, five children, a son-in-law, two grand children, a brother and sister in Sweden, besides many other relatives and friends to mourn their loss. Two children preceded her to the grave.

## COUNTY AGENT SAYS IS MISQUOTED

Editor Outlook:—Several cases have come to my attention where I have been misquoted by agents or solicitors handling questionable or high profit materials. I have been approached by parties who are soliciting in this county, wanting letters of recommendation, that they might have to sell their wares, all of which I have refused and will continue to refuse, if not a beneficial nature.

Farmers will do themselves a justice, as well as helping the cause of the rural residents, if you will demand the authority in the way of a letter when any agent or solicitor quotes the county agriculturist.

The question of inoculating the soil is one that has been attracting some attention, but up to the present time we have no definite demonstrations in this section to determine its value with either clover or vetch. The price of the inoculation is one that should be considered. The Agricultural College at Corvallis, Oregon, puts out the inoculation to the farmers at actual cost, which is usually for about one tenth of which many of the so-called bacteria companies ask.

The liming of soils is also in its demonstration stage here yet, and beware of the high priced lime. Ground limerock should test about 90 per cent and should be at a very reasonable price to be practical. Demand an authenticated chemical analysis of lime before making any purchase. Don't buy a pig in a bag.
