We believe the latter to be in harmony with the teaching of Scripture. The law was given to curb the evil nature.

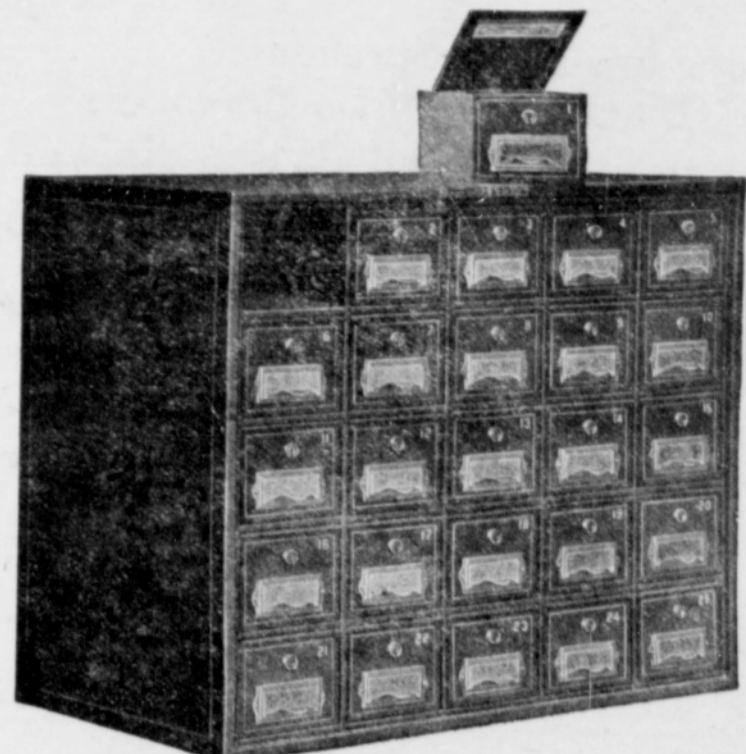

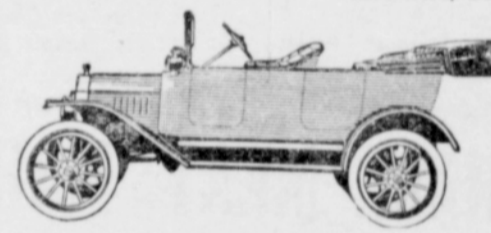
