### WHITE CLOVER SEED FROM 125 ACRES

Probably the largest white clover seed farm in Oregon is being developed near Barton, where D. O. Smith has 33 acres under cultivation and is preparing about 80 acres more which will be devoted to the same crop.

Mr. Smith sold 150 pounds of the seed here yesterday, the wholesale price being 65 cents a pound.

The eighty acres to be sown this spring is now being prepared for the plow, several teams and men being hard at work preparing the ground.

White clover grows rank but is not tall, like other grass, and the method is to clip the tops with a mowing machine.

### FUNERAL RITES OF MRS. W. C. BELT

The funeral of Mrs. W. C. Belt, who died on last Thursday, took place on Saturday, Rev. A. C. Brackenbury officiating. Interment was made in Lone Fir cemetery. The pall bearers were J. T. Stillions, Matt Shanno, C. L. Crenshaw and H. Johnson. A song service was rendered by C. E. Rusher, Mrs. A. C. Brackenbury, Mrs. Myrtle Myers and Chase St. Clair. Mrs. Fred Fieldhouse presided at the organ.

Mrs. Belt was a life long member of the Methodist Episcopal church, a devoted christian and a patient sufferer. She especially endeared herself to those who cared for her during her last illness. To one dear friend she said, "pray for me that I may go to sleep and awake with Jesus. I am very weak." Mr. Waltman described her death as one of the most beautiful she had ever witnessed. During her last moments she repeated the chorus of "Jesus Lover of My Soul," and when asked if there was anything she wanted she answered, "meet me in heaven," and again the chorus came, "Jesus, Lover of My Soul."

Mrs. Belt was born in Galena, Ill., March 4, 1844 and was an intimate friend of General Grant's family. She moved to Redwood Falls, Minn., where she was married to W. C. Belt on December 14, 1868. They went to Denver, Colorado, in 1882 and then came to Portland in December 1899. She died at the age of 72 years and 19 days, leaving an only son, R. B. Belt, who resides here, and a brother, Neal Byington, at Redwood Falls.
