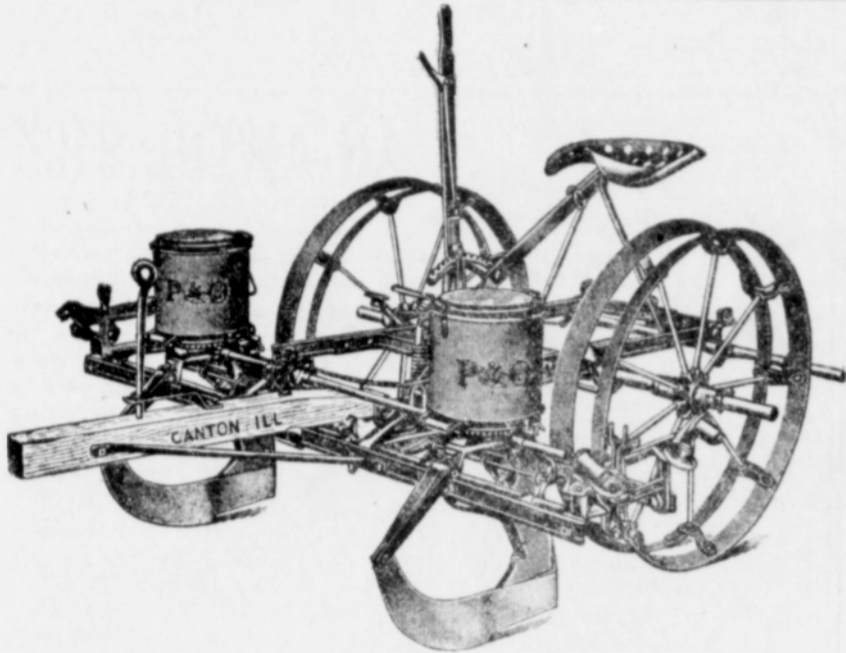

THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH

Chapter 14.

The resurrection of Christ was the greatest event that ever occurred or ever will occur. It took place not on the Jewish Sabbath but on the first day of the week.

The first day of the week was designated by divine authority, not only by the resurrection, but also by the outpouring of the Holy Ghost at Pentecost. This feast began on the day after the Jewish Sabbath, or in other words the first day of the week, and it continued seven Sabbaths complete and the fiftieth day was the great feast, this also falling on the first day of the week.

Here we have a gathering of the disciples for religious purposes on the first day of the week, and God sets his approval to it in the most remarkable way ever known, and more people were converted on this new first day Sabbath at the dawn of the Holy Ghost dispensation than had been converted on the seventy-eight thousand Mosaic Sabbaths that had passed during the fifteen hundred years of Judaism.

Here at the two greatest events connected with the christian church, the resurrection and the descent of the Holy Ghost, both of which occurred on the first day of the week. Is it any wonder the disciples would place special emphasis on this day after seeing these things? We are not surprised when we read in John 20:19 that they were again gathered on the first day of the week, and Christ appeared among them, and gave them additional evidence of his resurrection, and breathed on them and said "Receive ye the Holy Ghost." If they were observing the wrong day as their time of holding services this would have been a splendid time for the Master to have told them so, but instead he gave them an additional blessing.

It has been said by a few that they were gathered on this day because they were afraid of the Jews. The record says no such thing; it says they had the doors shut for fear of the Jews. Read it again, brother. And while you are reading, go on to the 26th verse and you will find that after eight days, on the next first day they were again assembled and Thomas who was absent before, was present this time, and again Jesus came in and produced sufficient evidence to remove every doubt from the mind of Thomas. That it was a common occurrence for the early churches to assemble on the first day of the week, is evident from the fact that casual reference is made to the fact in connection with various local churches.

In Acts 20:7 we find the church at Troaz gathered on the first day of the week to break bread, we understand this to mean the Lord's supper. Paul visited them and preached until midnight. Surely no one will deny this being a religious gathering. Did the great apostle to the Gentiles reprove them for holding their religious services on this day? So far from it that he became the speaker of the occasion, and no doubt but he was largely responsible for their use of this day as a Sabbath for he had written to the churches of Galatia a year previous to this and given orders to them to take a collection on the first day of the week, 1 Cor. 16:1; the most reasonable construction would be that when they gathered in their services on the first day of the week that they were to take a collection, for the collection was the prominent thought and a weekly system was advised and the time of taking it was only referred to incidentally, and of course the regular Sunday service was the best time for doing it. He then proceeds in the second verse of the same chapter to give the same instructions to the church at Corinth. The first day of the week, called Sunday is frequently called the Lord's day. This name was given to it by St. John while in exile on Patmos, and on this day had visions recorded in the book of Revelations. See Rev. 1:10. To be continued.
