Ups and Down of Romance.

Once more romance is forced to beat a retreat before the steady advance of practical business. Wall street has organized a corporation for the purpose of sweeping the floors of the sea for treasures sunk long ago in ships that sailed and never made their port. Henceforth, with all the witchery and glamour and mystery of gold-laden galleons, of the Spanish Main, of pirates and buccaneers, of maidens fair and warriors bold, of battles royal on the ocean's highways, of island refuges and reefs of coral—with these, henceforth, will be associated, not the romance of old, but the familiar jargon of capitalistic centers. The pursuit of treasure will be discussed in terms of cumulative preferred, bonuses of common, directors and dividends.

And everything will be mathematically precise. No longer will an ancient parchment serve as guide to wealth that lies beneath the sea. No more will tales told long ago by strange sailors, imparted under oath of secrecy when death hovered nigh, serve to hale the treasure seekers forth upon their quest. The Inter-oceanic Submarine Engineering company will concern itself with nothing of that sort. "When Wall street," says the New York World, "takes up the treasure ship it pays more attention to hydrostatics than to tropic moons. It devises new means of dealing with the pressure of deep water. It lists known wrecks, their latitude and longitude, the depth at which they lie, the character of the bottom and the imperishable nature of their contents. Also, it makes terms with the insurance companies first."

So romance languishes. But may it not be barely possible that some new romance, romance of another sort, may be rising to take its place? Stock is to be sold. And, incidentally, does not Wall street already know a good deal about "hydrostatics" and water pressure and wrecks? And is not the quest of submerged treasure something, as ever, to conjure with? Sun Temple in Colorado.

Evidence recently brought to light by ethnologists in the employ of the Smithsonian Institution shows that in some pre-historic age there existed in what is now the Mesa Verde national park, in southwestern Colorado, a sun temple sixty-four feet wide by 340 feet long. The temple has now been almost completely uncovered, revealing thick walls still intact. The explorers, however, believe that the temple was never completed, for their excavations have revealed nothing but the massive walls. Its age is also a matter of some speculation, but when the site was first opened, the temple was completely hidden by a mound out of the peak of which grew a cedar tree with 360 annual rings. This tree must have sprouted as far back as 1540, or about the time Coronado, the discoverer of the southwest, first entered what is now southern New Mexico. It is estimated that the temple walls must have been built at least 200 years before the tree began to sprout.

By a process of elimination it has been suggested that it could have been nothing but a temple for sun worship. Although divided into several rooms, it is manifest that it was not used for living purposes, for there are no remains of pottery such as was then used for domestic pur-

poses, nor are there marks of smoke on the walls. It could hardly have been a fort, for there are no loopholes or no reservoir for water to supply defenders during a siege. On the other hand, there have been found about the remains certain characteristics, peculiar to ceremonial rooms, known as kivas. And in a prominent place in one corner is a shrine built on the corner stone. On the floor of this shrine is a fossil palm leaf, identified as representing the sun, and suggesting the name, sun temple. In general the architecture resembles that of the cliff dwellers known to have inhabited the Mesa Verde, although the building itself is apparently a unified structure built according to a careful plan, while the cliff dwellings were built a room at a time and with little regard for general appearance. But the structural devices employed are of the same general nature.

The 365 rapids traversed by the last party to pass through the Grand Canyon of the Colorado dropped them a total of 6,000 feet to the Gulf of Lower California, the trip covering 1,400 miles and requiring exactly 101 days.
