## Business English Women.

English women, particularly those of the nobility, are doing all manner of things, some of them quite freakish, for the benefit of the soldiers in the field and the people at home who are sufferers through the war. In a single issue of a London paper, we are told that Lady Arthur Paget is helping to organize a jumble sale at the Caledonian market this month in aid of the wounded allies' relief committee; that Lady Eileen Wellesley, only daughter of the Duke of Wellington, is to appear as a court lady at a matinee which the countess of Lytton is organizing in aid of her own hospital; that the Countess Brassey is collecting tin canisters and herself helping to punch holes in them to make them into collection boxes for "lamp day" when tiny cardboard lamps are to be sold in honor of Florence Nightingale, and to help the hospitals. But more extraordinary and more practical is the campaign that has been started by Lady Denman, who wants everybody to keep at least one hen, and thus, as patriots should, make England independent of the lay of foreign hens.

To the proprietor of a large establishment where the water supply is drawn through a meter, the matter of leakage is important. A means of detecting and locating these leaks has been devised. The appearance of the instrument used is much like the receiver of a standard telephone set. The point of the instrument is placed in contact with an iron rod driven in the ground or into the key which has been placed in position on a street surface valve, and if there is any leak in the vicinity, it is betrayed by sounds in the instrument.

A circular recently issued by the Missouri agricultural experiment station records the results of a comparison made in 1912 between two groups of farmers, viz: 554 who had received only a rural school education and 102 who had received a greater amount of education, extending on an average, through two years of high school. From this comparison it appears that the better educated farmer is making an income of 71.4 per cent. greater than the farmer with less education, and even after the labor income of the latter is adjusted to allow for his smaller size of business, the difference still amounts to about 40 per cent.
