

PROGRAM FOR FIELD DAY OF ALL GRANGES

Nearly all preliminary arrangements were made by the grange committee on Field day entertainment at a meeting held at the fair grounds on Sunday.

Chairman J. J. Johnson reported that W. J. Kerr, president of the Oregon Agricultural college, had accepted an invitation to be present and deliver an address. State Master C. E. Spence will be here also but no reply has been received from C. B. Kegley, master of the Washington state grange.

The committee on speakers is J. J. Johnson, H. A. Lewis and Eugene D. Palmer. They will extend an invitation to Governor Withycombe of Oregon and Governor Lister of Washington. Mayor Stapleton is expected to make the address of welcome.

The committee on sports, as named, consists of H. A. Darnall, J. W. Mills, E. L. Thorpe, R. I. Anderson, R. W. Gill and H. A. Lewis.

A chorus of 100 or more voices will be in training for the event under the direction of Mrs. Anna Patten. The members of the chorus will come principally from the ten granges of the county, but many others will be invited to assist. The local committees on music are as follows:

A publicity committee, consisting of H. A. Lewis, E. L. Thorpe, L. H. Wells and R. W. Gill was appointed. One thousand posters was authorized printed and distributed; also 2500 programs. The posters will be circulated all over the county as soon as possible.

Beyers' concert band will be engaged for the day and the Beyers' orchestra will be given a concession for a dance in the pavilion if a dance is desired. The band and orchestra matter was referred to J. S. Albell, R. W. Gill and E. L. Thorpe.

Bids are being received for concessions on the fair grounds, all such concessions except a popcorn wagon which is being arranged for by H. A. Lewis, were left to E. L. Thorpe for sale.

Arrangements of the grounds was placed in the hands of H. A. Lewis, who will engage his assistants.

Those who attend the field day meeting should bring basket lunches for themselves and their invited friends. Hot coffee will be sold on the grounds.

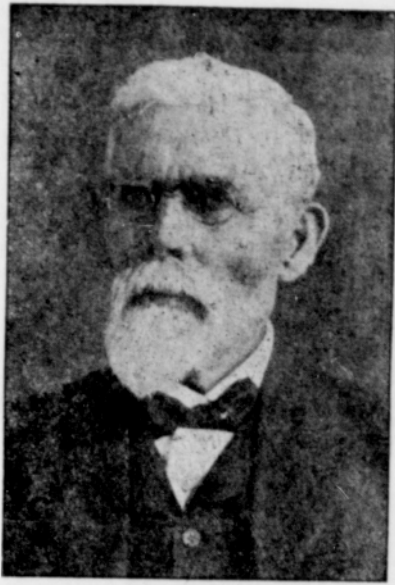
Field day this year will be Saturday, July 29.

DEATH LAYS CLAIM TO EARLY PIONEER



SAMUEL B. JOHNSON

Samuel B. Johnson, one of the pioneers of 1852, died at his home in Gresham on Saturday morning last after nearly a year of confinement from two strokes of paralysis, which was the real cause of his death.

The following sketch of his life was given in the story of his sixtieth wedding anniversary which occurred four years ago on May 4th:

From many standpoints, the life and work of Samuel Boone Johnson is worthy of emulation, as illustrating what may be accomplished by perseverance in the face of little encouragement, and practically no material assistance. Mr. Johnson was born in Howard county, Mo., February 5, 1833, his father's farm being near Booneslick. On May 2, 1852, he started across the plains to far off Oregon, to seek his fortune.

Two days later, just after crossing the Missouri state line, the ox train was halted, a minister of the party was summoned and S. B. Johnson and Hannah Hink, standing between two wagons, were united in holy wedlock. This marriage, commonly called an elopement, was an interesting feature of the long journey. They came out at the mouth of the Sandy river and located on the Clackamas river at what is now Oregon City. During the winter they stayed in the town, which was then a small settlement, and in 1853 he went up the Clackamas and worked in a sawmill for a few months. A little later he located on a donation claim of 320 acres one mile west of what is now Damascus. A year later he sold out and located on another tract of 320 acres not far from the first farm.

For many years Mr. Johnson was interested in the sawmill business. About 13 years ago the family moved to Gresham where Mr. Johnson built a commodious residence and where he spent his last days. He leaves, besides his wife, two sons, W. H. and E. R. Johnson, both of Portland, three brothers and a sister in California and a sister, Mrs. Mary Kesterson, of Sycamore.

The funeral took place on Monday forenoon from the Gresham Baptist church, Rev. A. J. Ware officiating. Interment was made in Damascus cemetery.

PREMIUMS FOR BEST EXHIBITS TO BE GIVEN AT ORIENT FAIR

Orient school district is preparing its third annual school fair which will be held during the first week of September. It is likely that the same display will be shown at the county fair in competition for the prize offered for such exhibits. Following are the rules and premium list:

Class A consists of boys and girls over 11 and under 18. Class B consists of boys and girls under 12 years. All competitors for prizes must be resident pupils of the District or regularly enrolled pupils in the school, as permitted pupils.

All displays made for prize money must be produced through the efforts of the boy or girl making the display, and in case of doubt the Board of Fair Directors reserve the right to require a signed statement from the parents or guardian of the child making such display.

No article shall receive a prize that has no competition. Any article can be entered in one display only.

Any animal cared for by a boy or girl shall be considered a pet. All entries must be made by 10:30 a. m. of the opening date of the fair.

No article shall receive a prize that has received a prize in any preceding fair.

PUBLICITY MATTERS ARE FOR COMMITTEE

The results of the meeting of the Gresham District Commercial club on Friday night were mostly of a publicity character and were put in charge of the newly appointed publicity committee. The committee as appointed by President Stapleton at this meeting consists of the following: George Honey, O. W. Tarr, Benj. Cameron, D. E. Towle, George Page, O. A. Eastman and J. Cannon.

The club has had under consideration for some time a plan to erect a sign at the Twelve-Mile crossing on the Base Line. The club has now authorized the publicity committee to design a suitable sign and have the same erected calling attention of auto tourists to the city located one mile south on the road to Portland. It will take some time to work out the plan carefully and this it is hoped can be done so that the sign will be in place when the hardsurfacing of the newly named Gresham avenue has progressed so that the road will be more passable than at present.

Plans were suggested for the next two meetings of the club, on July 21st and August 25th. These are to be of a publicity character and each will include a luncheon with special speakers. The carrying out of the plan was committed to the publicity committee.

It was voted to not hold other regular meetings of the club during the months of July and August except the two mentioned above unless matters needing special action should arise.

MORE RECRUITS WANTED TO FILL VACANCIES

Postmistress McColl has received a dispatch from Camp Withycombe under date of July 1, which reads:

"Seven hundred recruits required at once to be shipped to the border to fill existing vacancies in Third Infantry, Oregon militia. Men between eighteen and thirty-five should apply in person to Captain Kenneth P. Williams, Infantry mustering officer, Clackamas, Oregon."

The above notice is being circulated as widely as possible all over the state, and it is expected that the necessary number of men will be secured within a short time. There are numerous other recruiting stations in different parts of the state.

JAP BABIES TO LINE UP FOR PRIZES

Good horse races are assured for the County fair this fall. In fact, they are expected to be better than ever, for the racing association has made arrangements for a racing card which will include the best horses in the northwest.

The races are to hold for three days during the fair week, Thursday, Friday and Saturday. For those three days the entrance fee to the fair grounds will be 50 cents. For the first two days it will be 25 cents. Season tickets will be one dollar.

The difference in the price of day tickets is explained by saying that the extra cost on the three racing days is what will be paid to the racing association together with thirty per cent of all season tickets. The evening admissions will be 25 cents as usual.

Beyer's concert band has been engaged for the fair, also Beyer's orchestra for dancing.

A Japanese baby show will be an attraction for the second day of the fair. A list of merchandise prizes will be offered. It is believed that this attraction will be a good advertisement for the fair as it is the first of the kind ever heard of. The contest will take place at 2 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon.

A five-year lease was authorized yesterday by the fair directors with the driving association, represented by J. J. Kaddery and O. J. Brown. The contract will be entered into by the officers of the two associations at a yearly rental of \$100 for the race track, the racing people to have full control of the grandstand and concessions during the racing days.

It was reported that the girls' canning contest at the fair between five teams was already an assured success. Teams from Russellville, Rockwood, Fairview, Corbett and Gresham will compete.

The fair board authorized the issuance of the Daily Outlook again for this year's fair. It will be the official fair paper with full programs of all events and the racing cards.

A higher grade of ribbons and banners for the stock division will be offered this year. They will be provided under the direction of the superintendent.

A new poultry house will probably be built. It is badly needed. Estimates of the costs will be had at the next meeting in August.
