The Germans are using at the present time a 104 millimeter anti-aircraft Krupp gun, 45 calibers long, which sends a projectile weighing 15 1/2 kilograms, with a muzzle velocity of 800 meters, to a height of 4,000 meters. It can be fired at the rate of fifteen rounds a minute. The shrapnel shell which it fires is said to burst into 625 fragments. Guns of this type, as well as those of 129 millimeters, are the ordinance which defends Ostend.
