### Saratoff and Pugacheff.

Saratoff, Russia, has been selected by the faculty of Warsaw university as an abiding place for the medical students who have fled from Poland. It is now a town with a population of more than 130,000, one of the great trading places on the River Volga. Saratoff was founded by the Tartars, who called it "Sara-tow," that is, "Yellow Hill." It was famous as the stronghold of Pugacheff, the robber chief, whose deeds are a tradition among the people on Russia's great river. His house, which still stands, was a fortress. One of the iron clamps which fasten the stones together is the date 1775 when the freebooter began to harass the country. He was the hero of the common people, a kind of Russian Robin Hood, endearing himself to them by hanging a great number of officials. He was finally captured by a Swedish officer, Colonel Michelsen, in the service of Catherine II, taken to Moscow in a cage and executed.
