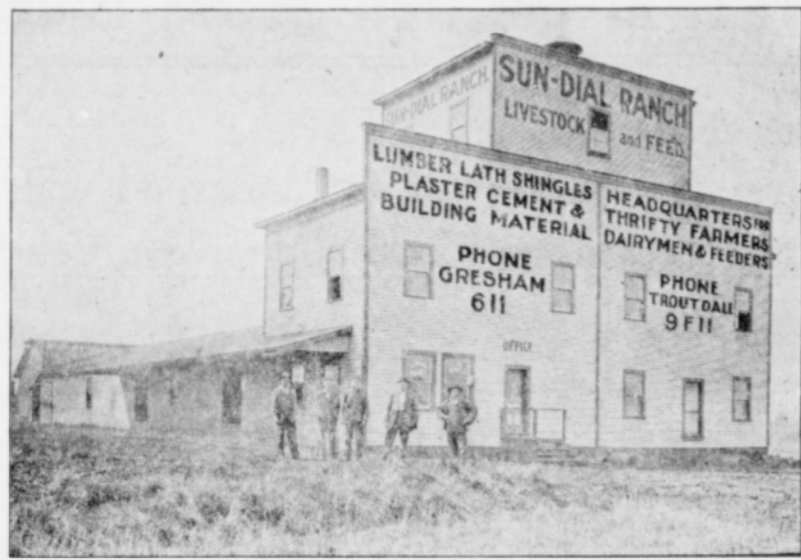

Details of the regulations fixing the prices of flour and bread in the principal cities of Australia are given in an article in the Melbourne Age. The price of flour is fixed at \$54.75 a ton, except in western Australia, where it is \$55.48. The price of bread in states other than Western Australia is fixed at 13.2 cents for a four-pound loaf sold over the counter, and 14.2 cents in Western Australia. Where a fraction of four pounds is bought a proportionate price is to be charged.
