NEW DIRECTOR ON FAIR BOARD VICE ROBERTS

At a meeting of the fair board, held on Friday, the resignation of D. M. Roberts was accepted on account of his appointment as postmaster of Gresham. His place was filled by the election of A. J. Krueger, manager of the Wilson stock farm, for the remainder of this year. Saturday night saw the end of the county fair for 1916. It was successful financially, although somewhat disappointing in some respects. The races on the last day and the baby show were special features; also the close of the canning contest. All were great attractions. Incidental to these was the launching of the candidacy of Mayor Geo. W. Stapleton for governor. He will be one of the republican aspirants two years from now. Mayor Stapleton was called to the race course by E. J. Werlein and presented with a tin horn and \$1 in honor of his having won a race while riding the famous burro, "William Jennings Bryan." Remarks were made by Judge R. R. Morrow and Frank Grant, and Mr. Stapleton was nominated for governor.

Fast Races Seen. The mixed pace and trot was the first race. There was a tie between Lena Patch and Charlie Mack, and another heat was trotted between them, Lena Patch being first and Charlie Mack second. In the free-for-all trot the record for time was broken in the first of the three heats, the time being 2:13, it being one of the best trots seen on the Gresham course. Tillamook Maid won in two heats. The results were: Indian Hal.....4 3 3 Tillamook Maid.....1 3 1 J. C. B.....2 2 dr Hal Stewart.....3 dr Time, first heat, 2:13; second, 2:18; third, 2:15. The pony race was won by Billy, with Trixy second.

Canning Contest. One of the most interesting features of the whole fair was the canning contest conducted by Miss Helen Cowgill of the O. A. C. extension course, with four teams of girls from as many different neighborhoods. They resulted as follows: Fairview school, 89 1/2 points out of possible 100, first place; Russellville school, second, with 84.2-3; Gresham school, third, with 83; Lynch school, fourth, with 80 1/2; Rockwood, fifth, with 76 1-6 points. The complete standing of the schools by points was as follows: Russellville—Team work, eight-teen points; skill, 17; speed, 16; neatness, 16 2-3; product, 17. Total, 84 2-3. Gresham—Team work, 17; skill, 18; speed, 12; neatness, 18; product, 18. Total, 83. Lynch—Team work, 17; skill, 13 1/2; speed, 19; neatness, 17; product, 14. Total 80 1/2. For the prettiest baby under one year, premium won by Mrs. Sophia Hotysedt, mother; best head of hair on baby under 1 year old went to Mrs. William Stanley, mother; smallest baby, won by baby of Mrs. Lulu Micklander; Mrs. Micklander's baby also took the prize for baby with best dark hair; best light head of hair, won by the baby of Mrs. Geo. Hayden; baby of Mrs. Dee Lewis won prize for prettiest dark eyes.

In the mention of livestock awards last Friday the Holstein exhibit made by A. H. Burns, of Troutdale, was unintentionally overlooked. Mr. Burns' herd showed up exceptionally fine and he won seven premiums, as follows: Junior calf, first; cow four years old and over, second; junior yearling, second; senior calf, first and third, heifer under two years, first; female, any age, first. 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REASONS WHY SOME PEOPLE COMPLAINED

Some disappointment has been expressed because of the lack of interest taken by many in the county fair held last week. It is true that there were disappointments all around because of certain conditions, but the principal reason is not hard to find. It was due mainly to the small allowance made for premiums, a matter entirely beyond the control of the management. Last year the state and county appropriations totaled \$4000; to that sum was added about \$650 more by the fair association. This year the available money was \$2500. It therefore became necessary to reduce the premiums with the result that there were fewer exhibitors and less interest in the fair than usual. Another reason for the lagging interest shown was seen in the disposition of many to criticize the fair board for charging 50 cents for single admissions on the last three days. Unreasonable people could hardly be convinced that the races had to be paid for, nor could they realize that the entrance fees were as low as any fair in Oregon and in some cases even lower. At Canby this week the gate prices are \$1.25 for season tickets; 50 cents for day tickets; and 25 cents for children between 8 and 12 years.

Another unavoidable reason was the lateness of the season in maturing farm products. Then, too, many persons were away, and it is a fact that the gay and lively crowds of several years ago are gone. The demonstration in Portland on Thursday kept many away; hop picking was on and hundreds of farmers were not free at this time. There were numerous causes for the lack of interest shown. But the fair was a success financially. It came out ahead by a good margin of profit, owing principally to the economical tactics adopted by Manager Lewis. Mr. Lewis worked hard and faithfully at considerable sacrifice to himself and should be given much praise. The few criticisms heard are harmless, but there will be advantage taken of all experiences that were encountered, in making next year's fair a greater success.

SECRETARY BROWN RESIGNS OFFICE

Secretary O. J. Brown, of the racing association, has resigned his office although he takes a deep interest in all matters pertaining to the racing features of the county fair. A pressure of other matters decided him to relinquish the job, also that of manager of the races. During the three days of racing here last week he was mainly instrumental in making it the most successful of any meet ever held on the Gresham track. Two track records were made and all results were satisfactory. Mr. Brown retires from his secretaryship with some regrets, and is desirous of expressing his appreciation to all who gave him and the association their assistance.

WOODROW WILSON LEAGUE WILL HOLD RALLY

Plans are under way for a big political rally under the auspicious of the Woodrow Wilson League next Wednesday evening, September 29, in Metzger's hall, Gresham. Mrs. M. L. T. Schneider will also have a prominent part and it is probable that Judge Gatens will also be present and speak. An appropriate musical program is being arranged by a committee, of which Mrs. J. N. Clananah is chairman. An invitation is extended to all to attend. Cash at First State Bank. All county fair warrants in favor of those who get their mail at Gresham will be found at the First State bank where they will be cashed upon endorsement.
