For the purpose of emphasizing the sanitary condition of the dairy of the state hospital at Napa, California, the Napa County Live Stock association held its annual banquet in the barn where the cattle are kept. Long tables were placed in an area between rows of stalls, and covers were laid for 120 persons. In the same room with the banqueters were 200 cows which were being milked.

Salaries paid by the manufacturing establishments of Wisconsin increased 46 per cent. in total amount between 1909 and 1914, according to a statement issued by the United States bureau of the census. Salaries and wages together increased 25.2 per cent. The capital invested in manufactures in 1914 was \$754,237,000, compared with \$605,657,000 in 1909.
