**FRAUDULENT PROMISES BRING MANY DIMES**

A press report from Minneapolis tells the story of a fraudulent scheme to get rich. In order to prevent anyone here from sending money to such a fake the following under date of October 24th is reproduced here:

Thousands\* of letters, each containing 10 cents, are pouring into the local post office daily from women in various parts of the country who have joined in an "endless chain" scheme promoted by the so-called National Brokerage Exchange. Federal agents are searching for officers of the "exchange" who are charged with using the mails to defraud. They disappeared three weeks ago.

To every woman who would send 10 cents in silver and write five friends urging them to join in the chain, the "exchange" promised a new "1917 model petticoat."

"The volume of mail for the "exchange" is rapidly growing," said Postmaster E. A. Purdy, "and in one day we received 25,000 letters, enclosing 25,000 dimes. Thousands of the letters have been returned to the writers but a large majority carry no return marks and as a result the dead letter office is becoming clogged."
