Pendleton Normal School Proven Necessity

(Copied from Portland Oregonian.)

MONMOUTH, Ore., June 26.—The Oregon Normal school opened this week . . . students enrolled 785, largest on record for state Normal in Oregon . . . how to care for large student body a problem . . . 800 being crowded into auditorium with seating capacity of 550. Galleries filled with extra chairs in aisles. More than 150 students seated on platform. New boarding houses completed, additions to rooming houses built and tents used. One hundred girls sleep on upper floor of school.

The official school report gives 150 grade pupils in Monmouth, for teacher practice.

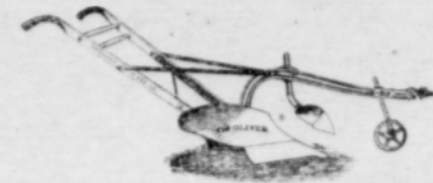
SINGLE TAX RECORD BY ASSESSOR REED

County Assessor Henry E. Reed, who is a candidate for re-election, has made an active campaign against the so-called land and loan amendment, the effect of which, if adopted, would be to make land common property by the confiscation of rent.

Mr. Reed has made a number of speeches against the amendment, one of which was delivered at Gresham. One argument which he has used very effectively is that the destruction of the selling value of land, which would follow upon the taking of the full ground rent, would paralyze agricultural development in Oregon rural credits. Both the Federal Farm Loan act now in force, and the pending rural credits amendment to the constitution of Oregon, take the land value as the security for farm loans. With this gone, as it would be should the amendment carry, there would be no value to land for mortgage security. The United States government would not extend its rural credits system to Oregon. It would find that the laws of Oregon would not afford sufficient protection to the holders of farm mortgages made under its authority and would place Oregon in the list of ineligible states for farm loans, there to remain while the objectionable laws continued in force.

Mr. Reed finds that the people of Multnomah county are greatly interested in agricultural development and will return an overwhelming majority against the laws and loan amendment.

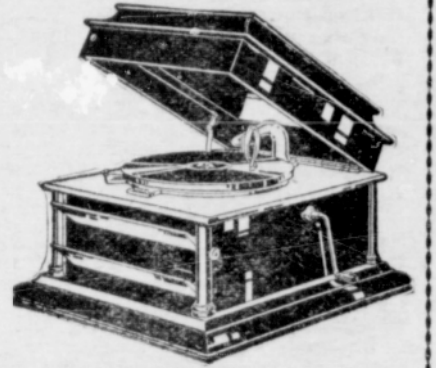

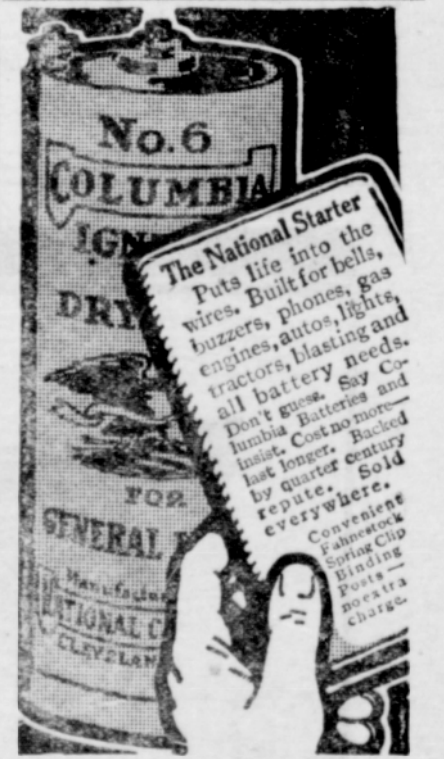

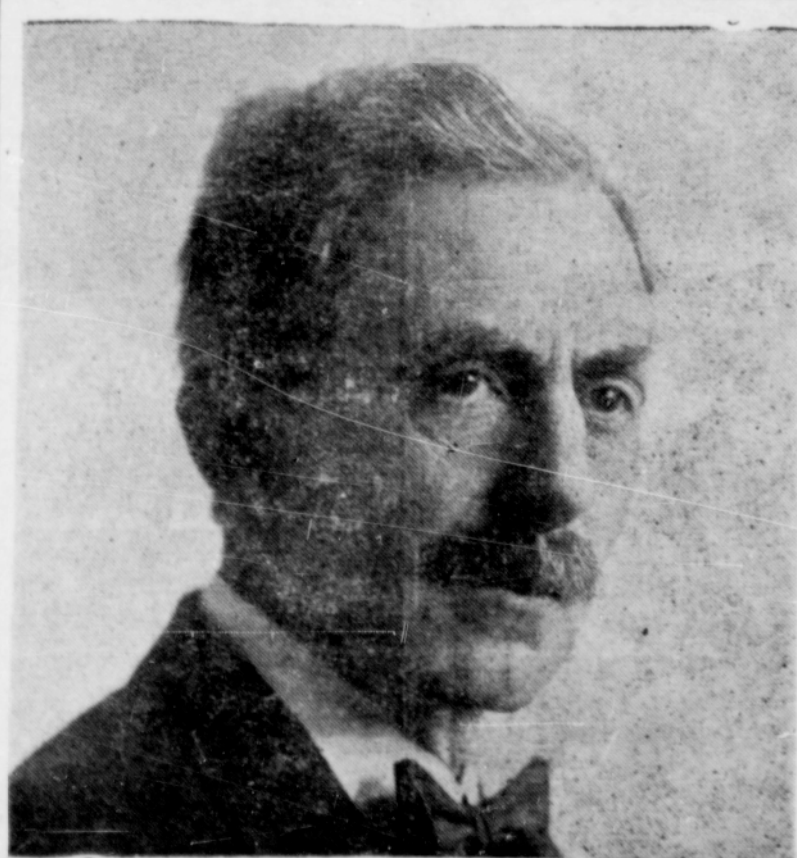
