The potatoes are bringing fancy prices this season and several parties here who planted from 15 to 20 acres will make a good stake and several new autos will be delivered this fall across the Sandy river as the result. Cabbages are in great demand too, and buyers are anxious to receive all at a good figure. W. Evans, who enlarged his home cannery this summer, has had a number of girls employed this fall. 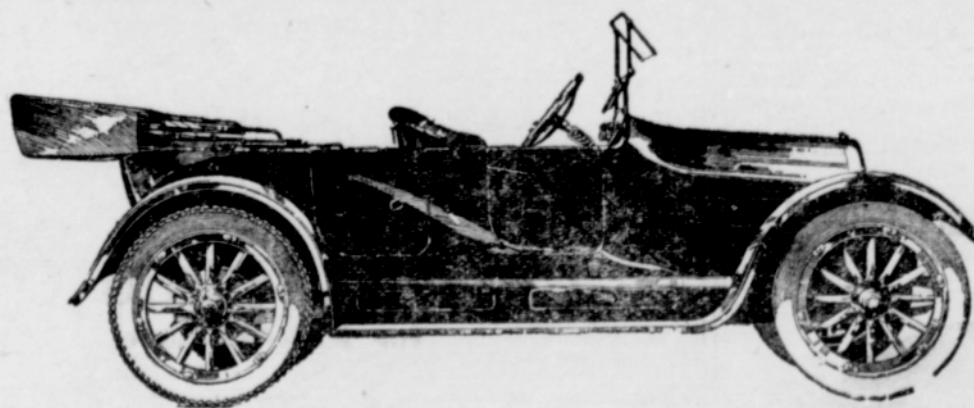
