"Jock" Bichan, formerly of the Sundial ranch, has been visiting Mr. and Mrs. James Burns here the past week.

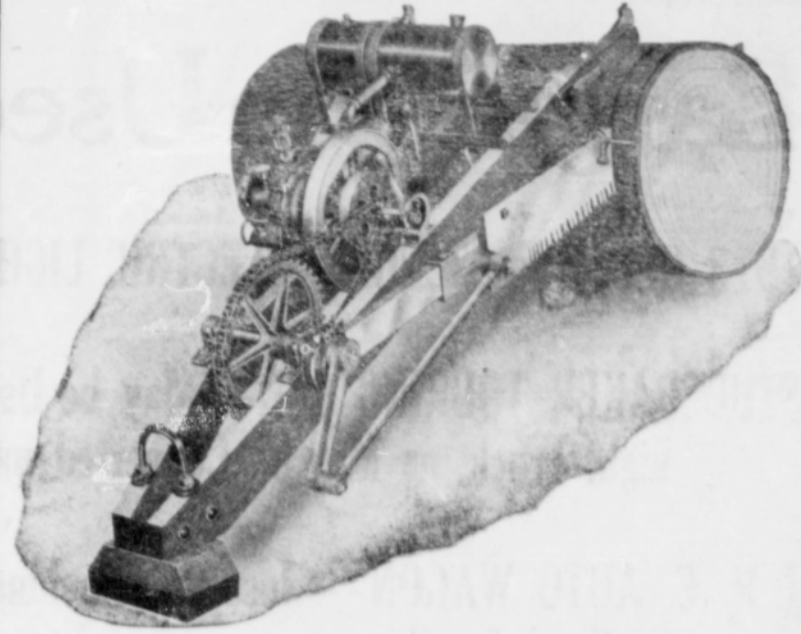
