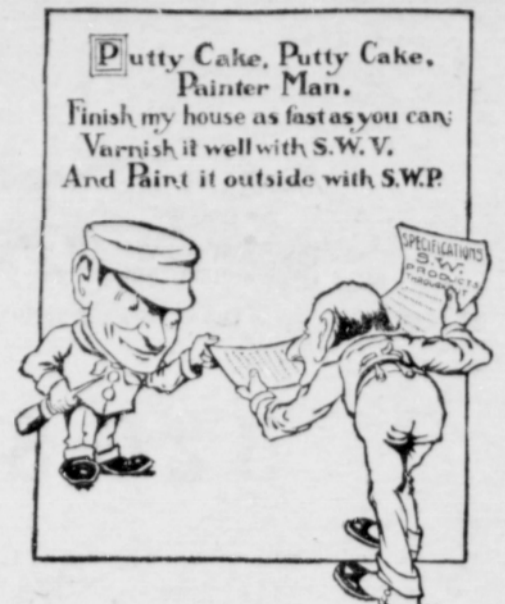

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for the County of Multnomah. Stella Long, Plaintiff, vs. Bert E. Long, Defendant.

To Bert E. Long, the above named Defendant.
In the name of the State of Oregon, you are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled court and cause on or before the 21st day of March, 1917, and if you fail to so appear and answer for want thereof, the plaintiff will apply to the court for a judgment and decree, as prayed for in plaintiff's complaint, to wit: For a decree of this court annulling and dissolving the existing bonds of matrimony now existing between plaintiff and defendant upon the ground and for the reasons set forth in the complaint, to wit: On the ground of cruel and inhuman treatment of plaintiff by defendant and his failure to properly or at all provide for or support plaintiff during the period of their marriage relations.

This summons is served upon you by publication in pursuance of an order made by the Honorable C. U.
