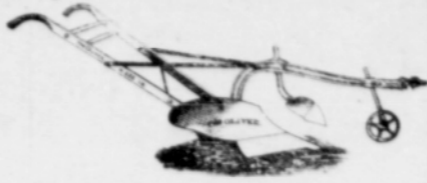

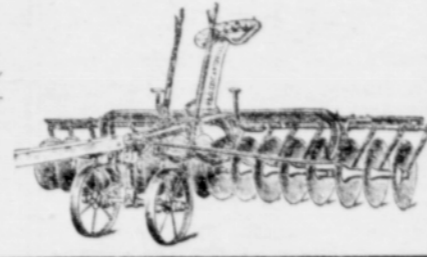

Cylinders: Cast en bloc (including upper half of crank case.) Head detachable for inspection.
