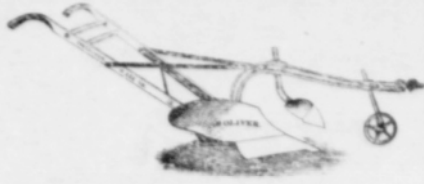

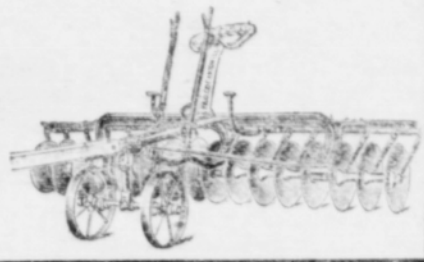

### Monroe's Other Doctrine.

On May 4, 1822, James Monroe, president of the United States, sent to congress a paper entitled "Views of the President of the United States on the Subject of Internal Improvements." This document is an exhaustive consideration of the power of congress to spend money on roads, canals and other projects of commercial and military importance. It contains many considerations that have been more or less relegated to the background by the history of the past ninety-five years; it also contains some expressions that have now a highly sardonic flavor, for example.

"My idea is that congress have an unlimited power to raise money, and that in its appropriation they have a discretionary power, restricted only by the duty to appropriate it to purposes of common defense and of gen-

eral, not local, national, not state, benefit."

James Monroe had never heard of public pork.

Eight years later Andrew Jackson, also President of the United States, in vetoing a road bill, recalled these words of Monroe and added:

"If it be the desire of the people that the agency of the federal government should be confined to the appropriation of money in aid of such undertakings, in virtue of state authorities, then the occasion, the manner, and the extent of the appropriations should be made the subject of constitutional regulation. This is the more necessary in order that they may be equitable among the several states, promote harmony between different sections of the Union and their representatives, preserve other parts of the Constitution from being undermined by the exercise of doubtful powers or the too great extension of those which are not so, and protect the whole subject; against the deleterious influence of combinations to carry by concert measures which, considered by themselves, might meet but little censure."

Yet Andrew Jackson may never have heard the motto: "You kiss me and I'll kiss you."
