Electric wheel chairs similar to those employed at the Panama-Pacific International exposition last year are being used successfully in Europe for the wounded and crippled soldiers. Invariably the convalescent men prefer to direct their own chair rather than to have some one push them about. One of these chairs, which is of Swiss make and costs a small sum, is equipped with a one-quarter-horse power motor suspended between the steering and rear wheel. Current is supplied from a battery of fifteen lead plate cells housed in three boxes beneath the seat. The battery is of fifty ampere hour capacity and provides sufficient energy for a run of thirty to forty miles. Five forward and five reverse speeds are provided. The steering and operating mechanism is of the very simplest.

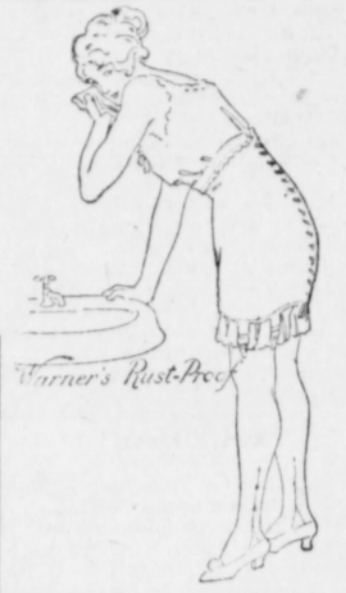
