AMAZING RETURN TO THE BICYCLE

The rapid return of the bicycle to popular favor is attested to by the amazing increase in the demand for new bicycles. Last year over 600,000 of the two-wheelers were placed in the hands of boys and girls of the United States and an even greater demand has been indicated for this year.

In view of this situation, many of the old-time bicycle men have expressed a hope that bicycle clubs such as abounded everywhere during the late nineties might be revived.

It is true that bicycle clubs are booming everywhere. At present over ten thousand boys are enrolled in the Fisk Bicycle clubs which are fostered by the Fisk Rubber company of Chicopee Falls, Mass. The plan of organization of these clubs is given on request to interested boys in the form of an attractive little booklet entitled the Fisk Club Manual. The national organization is known as the Fisk Bicycle clubs of America. There is a monthly magazine which is devoted solely to the interests of these clubs. Considerable valuable equipment is given to club members free of charge.

It is believed that no less than

25,000 boys will be enrolled in these bicycle clubs before the summer is over.

Geo. B. Thomas, an old resident of Bull Run, died at that place on Wednesday, April 4, aged 96 years, 11 months and 4 days. The funeral was held from the residence today, with interment in Cliffside cemetery.

Future World Granary.

One of the largest wheat merchants of Manitoba, who is here from Winnipeg, speaks of that territory as the "twentieth century granary of the world." Winnipeg, he says, is already referred to as the "Chicago of Canada," and he states boldly "the time is not far distant when Winnipeg will stand unrivalled as the center of a vast area of the world's greatest wheat production. Soon after the wild territory, then known as western Canada, was organized into the Province of Manitoba, there were no railroads in that section, and those who came from Quebec or Ontario had to travel first to Chicago, then to St. Paul, and northward from there it was a hike of 450 miles over the prairies, to reach Winnipeg.
