

CURFEW BELL WILL BE HEARD MONDAY NIGHT

Commencing next Monday night the curfew bell will be rung at 9 o'clock. Nine taps of the fire bell at intervals of fifteen seconds will be the signal for every boy or girl, under sixteen years of age, in Gresham to get off the streets unless accompanied by a parent or guardian.

A committee of women from the W. C. T. U., consisting of Mrs. George F. Honey, Mrs. K. A. Miller and Mrs. Hattie Wostell, appeared before the city council on Tuesday night with the request that the existing curfew ordinance be enforced, and the council ordered the city marshal to enforce it. This action was taken upon the representation that many children were in the habit of remaining out late at night who should be at home. During the winter months, commencing October 1, the bell will be rung at 8 o'clock. The ordinance is an old one but has not been enforced for about four years.

The council engaged in a long discussion over the proposed drainage of the property along Hood avenue, a subject that has been hanging fire for several months. City Engineer H. J. Stocker made an examination of the conditions, and it was mainly upon his report that the council ordered an old drainage ditch opened so as to allow the overflow and surface water to escape into the gulch on the Ely property at the rear of the brick blacksmith shop. It was also ordered that all septic tanks draining into the ditch be required to make their discharges elsewhere.

The ordinance licensing junk dealers was passed to its third reading and left over until the next session of the council.

City Recorder Schneider reported that the Portland Railway Light & Power company had approved the suggested plan of draining the head of Hood avenue by putting a drain pipe beneath its roadbed near the Mount Hood station and that the work was being done, thereby diverting any overflow to the north of the track on Division street.

SIXTY COWS COMING HERE FROM SLOUGH

A. D. Cates, who is extensively engaged in the dairying business on the peninsula at the mouth of the Willamette river, is preparing to move his herd of sixty dairy cows to higher ground on account of the threatened high water.

Mr. Cates has leased the former C. E. Cleveland farm two miles south of Gresham and will bring his herd there from where he will conduct his dairy business as usual for about three months.

All the dairymen on the low lands along the Columbia and Willamette rivers are fearful of a flood this year, and all are preparing to move their herds while the overflow lasts and until the pastures grow again.

TEST PLACES GRADE COW AT HEAD OF ASSOCIATION LIST

The regular monthly report of the Gresham-Columbia Slough Cow Testing association shows a gain in butter fat production and a longer list of cows than in April. The tests show some remarkable changes in production. Lucy, a grade Holstein, not in the list for March, tops the honor roll.

Iowand Spring, another cow not on the roll for March, owned by Pomeroy & Son, stands second. Johanson Bros. Rosie, the top notcher last month has dropped to third place. Some others have dropped out entirely which were near the top at last report.

Concerning the record for April and May, the following interview from Dana S. Frame, official tester, and H. G. Mullenhoff, secretary of the association, is given:

"A month ago there were but 26 cows on the honor roll while now we have 34 and must remember that there is one less day than in March. The production in general is much higher and for once we cannot lay it to green feed nor warmer weather, merely to the fact that the cows are good and the dairymen are doing more scientific work. Mr. Mullenhoff's cow, Josie, freshened December 14 and since that time, a little over four months, has made four hundred and twenty-two and forty-three hundredths pounds of butter fat. When the year's summary is figured she will probably approach the 600 pound mark."

"Lucy, a grade cow belonging to Mr. Luscher, tops the association list this month and it may be remembered that this cow also topped the list last June. She is of good type and has a wonderfully shaped square udder. She has a good test and we might say that this is one of the features that official testing brings out in a dairy herd."

"Johanson Bros' cow again produced over sixty pounds of butter fat and bids fair to keep up the pace. She is the cow that headed our list last month and also the one that was once sold to the butcher."

"The Multnomah County Farm herd has recently been placed on test and there were found to be several

good producers in the herd, four of them being placed on the honor roll during the first month of test. There are several registered animals on the farm that are making creditable showing but owing to the lack of previous records they do not show up in the records as well as some of the cows which have freshened recently, but when the yearly record is made out they will be placed among the highest producers."

"Mr. C. H. Johanson who has a milking herd of fourteen cows has five of them on the honor roll this month and has never had less since December. This is Mr. Johanson's second year in the association and needless to say he is very much interested in another association this coming year."

"Kelvin Grove's herd of registered Ayrshires has recently been placed on official test to determine which of his cows were the best producers. The results were very gratifying to the company when they found that fifty

GRESHAM DEALER SELLS WHEAT LAND

W. F. Honey, of Gresham, has this week closed up two large real estate deals in eastern Oregon that will probably be ranked among the largest transactions of the spring deals in wheat lands.

Mr. Honey was advertising several large wheat tracts near Lone several months ago and it was one of these he sold last Monday. This transaction covered 7000 acres at a price of about \$75,000 cash. It was sold to Gustave Friwald, a former brewer of Portland and Eugene.

Mr. Friwald is intending to cultivate the farm this season and will raise wheat. He already has one heavy tractor at work and will buy another.

A second deal was closed yesterday by Mr. Honey in the vicinity of Echo, when he sold 1120 acres to R. R. Lewis for about \$12,000, or at a slight advance over the price per acre received for the other tract. He still has about 6000 acres left. Wheat land has advanced in price two dollars per acre, as there is an unprecedented demand for such property.

FIRE TRUCK IS AIM OF VOLUNTEERS

The Gresham Volunteer Fire Department has launched a movement to secure for Gresham and surrounding territory a large motor chemical fire truck, thoroughly equipped with the most modern and complete fire fighting apparatus. The cost of the truck must be met mainly by popular subscription.

The territory covered will comprise an area of about forty square miles with Gresham as a center. It will be possible with this equipment to go out a distance of three and a half miles in any direction and give the surrounding territory a better fire protection than the town has heretofore had, in fact, as good as is had in an equal area in the larger cities, except of course for city water.

The advantages will be many. An assured fire protection will lessen the cost of insurance. The country needs this protection as much as the city. In fact, it is believed the proportion if country fires within the radius it is proposed to cover have been as great during the past few years as the city fires, both in number and monetary loss. And the loss would have been greater had it not been that the Gresham department has responded quickly and as effectually as possible considering the small apparatus and difficulty of picking up somebody to haul it.

The Gresham department is well organized, is permanent, and has proved its efficiency in the past and should be given an equipment better suited to the needs of this well settled locality.

If every property owner will calmly consider what it will be actually worth to him to know that any time, day or night, if his house or barn should catch fire, a big auto chemical will in a few moments roll up to his door and trained men will turn on a stream of extinguishing fluid, saving hundreds, perhaps thousands of dollars of loss, he will be generous in his support of the plan undertaken by the fire boys.
