The ladies of the Baptist Aid society will meet with Mrs. George Moulton of Lusted, Thursday afternoon, May 24.

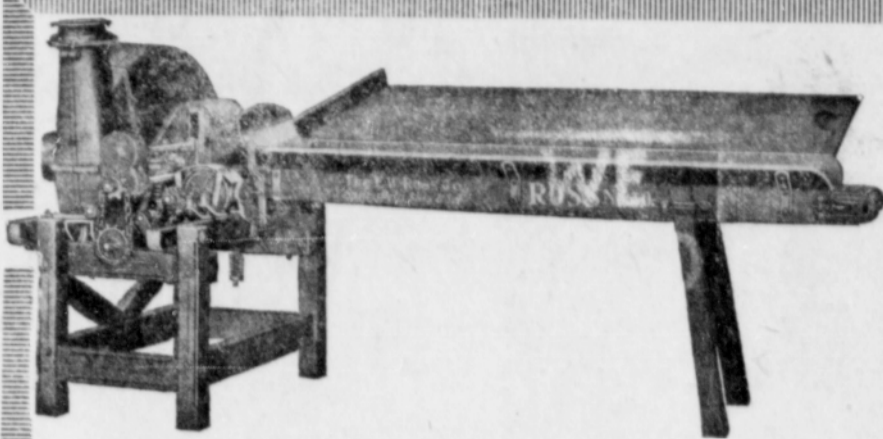

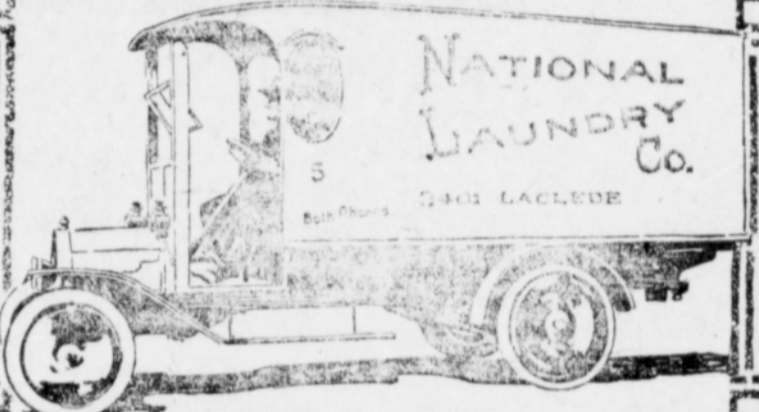
