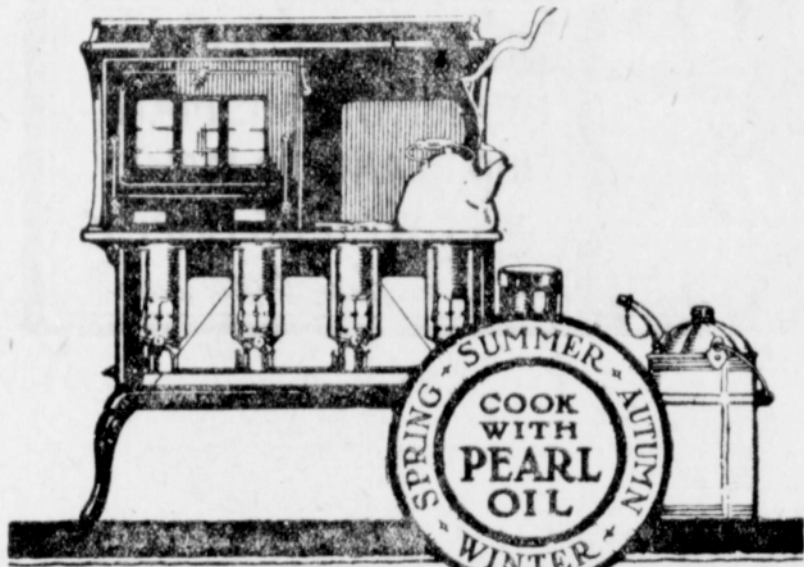

The many friends of Miss Maude Decker miss her smiling face when going to Ventura grocery. Miss Maude is now employed at the Meier & Frank department store.

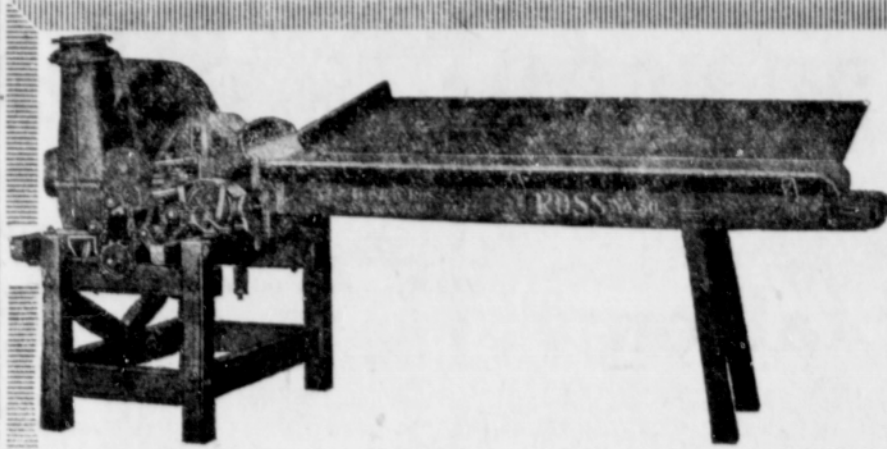

Financial Comparisons.

GRESHAM, May 23.—Editor Outlook:—According to R. G. Dunn, prices increased on dairy and garden products 84 per cent, meat 46 per cent, clothing 45 per cent, metals 69 per cent, foodstuffs 195 per cent, between the years 1914 and 1917.

During the same period wages have risen about 18 per cent. Congress has just passed a \$1,800,000,000 war tax bill, this means \$18.00 per capita for every man, woman and child in the United States, or \$90.00 for the head of each family of five persons. And this is just a starter, and yet with all this appalling increase in taxation and high cost of living, there are lots of people asking the voters of Oregon to add to their burden an additional \$6,000,000 bonded indebtedness and they are also asking to have the pay of the legislators doubled. Can we stand it?
