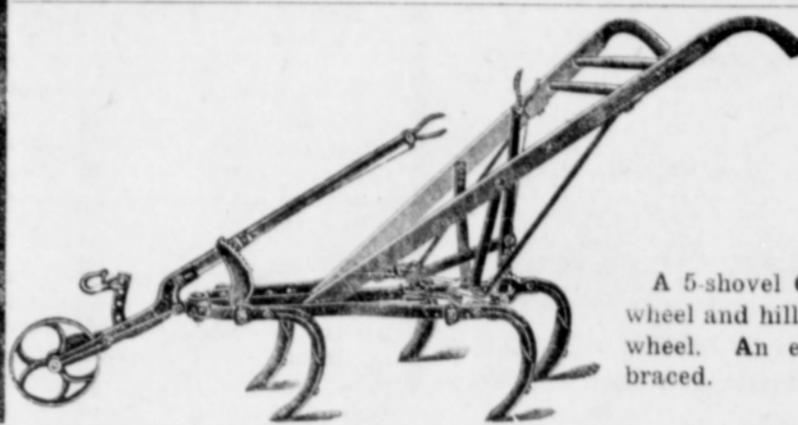
Loyde Dunn has enlisted as an engineer and Gordon Manary in the cavalry.

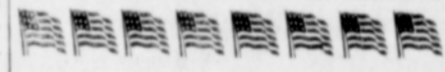
