A WAR OF METALS.

The war which we are fighting today is essentially a war of metals. Uncounted tons of metals are thrown from warring cannon every hour of the day. France and England and Russia are spending hundreds of millions of wealth for metal with which to compass the destruction of their foes. America has commenced to do the same, and the United States is now straining every nerve to produce metals sufficient to keep those great guns on the east and west points supplied with ammunition. And, as the countries at war today are dependant upon the metals, so will the countries of the future when they go to war be dependant upon the metals. Steel and copper and platinum are the things that are winning the wars today. They will be the deciding factors in future wars.

So it is pleasant to contemplate the fact that Oregon is by no means poor in metals. This state is richer in metallic wealth than the whole German empire. And that wealth is yet almost untouched of man. Sporadic attempts have in other years been made to develop our iron and steel resources, but never with any marked success.

It is also pleasant to note that the iron mines at Oswego and the great smelter there are to be operated again, this time in earnest if the announcements presage anything. A big rolling mill is also to be built somewhere below Portland, and it is among the possibilities that another great industry will assume definite shape, and that Portland will in time be known as the Pittsburg of the west.

The high prices of all metals are inducing men of wealth to look to Oregon for a newer and easier source of supply. Mining operations of considerable extent are under way in many parts of the state, and there is every prospect that if the war shall last two more years, Oregon will be honey-combed with iron mines. More than two dozen other varieties of valuable minerals are said to be beneath the surface of our soil in quantities to warrant that development which is sure to come with the higher prices of this time.

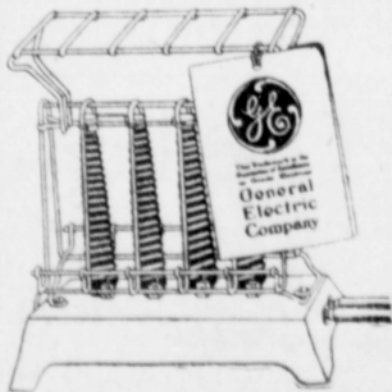
