A laboratory to be created at Helsingfors, Finland, for the study of technical industrial problems, will be supported in part by the government, but largely by a number of private concerns.

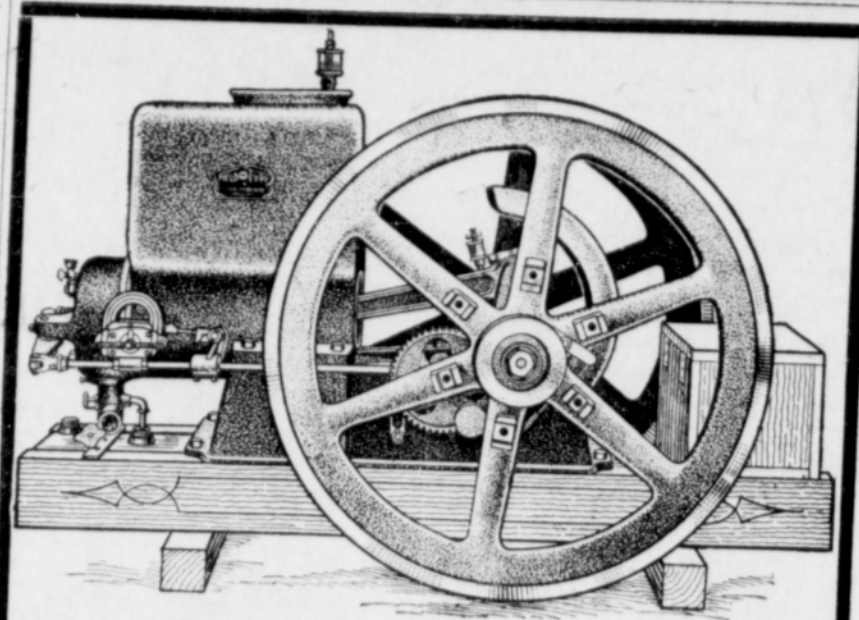
