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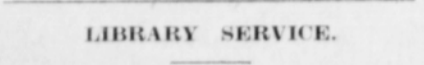

The American public library has during the last twenty years undergone a wonderful change in the direction of usefulness.

SENATOR LANE'S GHOST.

GREAT BUT NOT STAGGERING.

It is said that the announcement of the prospective war requirements had a "staggering effect" in congress.

Rather it is likely that this staggering actually took place "in" as distinct from "throughout" congress—that there are some poor little fellows in the national legislative body who haven't got far enough out of themselves yet to learn that there is an American war, and to be for the war to the full extent of their personal and representative capacity.

There is nothing staggering about the next war budget. It is big, of course, as budgets go in this country, which has hardly touched the edge of the war as yet, but it represents only the beginning of the process by which America is to take up its share of the war load.

Expensive business? Of course. We always do things expensively. We are paying our soldiers enough to enable them to buy wrist watches, while other soldiers are thinking twice about their smoking bills, or are fighting for nothing—as in France.

Most everybody understands this. Loan will follow loan, and war revenue bills will succeed each other as the seasons change. That is a part of the game. It is hard to understand how anybody can be staggered by the prospect except the simple-minded souls who really thought they were being kept out of the war and haven't discovered the facts in the case.

The mother who "didn't raise her boy to be a soldier" probably was afraid that he would associate with "roughnecks in the army." Also, she probably forgot to think about the associations of the poolrooms.

If Ex-president Taft has not fully recovered we think it would only be justice to him to get him out of Kansas and bring him to Oregon. He would meet with a cordial welcome in Gresham.

That "sufficient unto the day" schedule is all right in its proper place, but it is mighty hard to convince people that they ought to eat in moderation if there is plenty in sight.
